A young Chicago man who was accused by one of the papers as being a spendthrift, has brought a libel suit against the paper for \$25,000, and if he wins his case can continue his career for some time longer.

An exchange says that since fashion has decreed that birds as well as women should be used to ornament the heads of women, a new source of revenue has been opened to the natives of southern California, where humming birds are found in great variety.

The net earnings of the lines of the Pennsylvania Railroad east of Pittsburgh for the past ten months of 1883, show an increase of \$550,478 over the same period of last year.

The business of the roads running west of Pittsburgh, shows a decrease of \$12,478, as compared with the ten months of 1882.

The Governor General and the members of the Cabinet of the Dominion of Canada are paid salaries amounting to \$155,000 yearly, which is \$19,000 more than is paid the President of the United States and his Cabinet.

The Governor General receives \$5,000 per year, the same as the President.

The Detroit Evening Journal has given a practical illustration of the operation of the 21 o'clock system of time-keeping by printing one issue with railroad time tables and other events of daily occurrence chronicle in the new style. In several editions were issued at 14 o'clock, 15 o'clock and 17 o'clock—equivalent to 2, 3 and 5 p.m., according to the usual notation.

It is said that the new time standard affects Cincinnati in a marked degree, the change of time being 22 minutes. The hotels have to change their hours for sale half an hour; the Burdett House for example, changing its breakfast hour from 7.30 to 7, and so on. The old local time is preserved wherever it is desired by having extra hands put on the clocks and watches.

Joliet, Ill., is enjoying a murder trial having many peculiar features. A convict who killed his cell mate is the defendant, and all the witnesses are convicts, some of whom have not seen the light of the outside world for twenty years. In ordinary cases the evidence of a convict would be disputed, but if this rule would hold good in the present instance, a trial murder would go unpunished. The trial is creating the greatest interest, and crowds are daily turned away from the court house.
