One good result of all this is, that water is kept out of the ditches during the winter months, and the streets are free from the long stretches of glassy ice which used to make locomotion a menace to life and limb. The people feel very hap-

py over the change, and apart from wondering how they got along so many years under the old conditions, declare they would not part with the new system for 10 times its cost. The benefits are really incalculable.

One result, however, which it was hoped to secure by piping the springs, has failed to materialize: the typhold cases have not been baulshed. Their appearance, alas, have been more numerous than ever, and with increased mortality. It is said that more deaths have occurred in the last three years in Providence than in any 20 previous years. Certain it is that the grim reap er has visited us with dreadful rapidity during the present century, and has removed many a loved one from our midst. The number of "first settlers" is fast diminishing, and only a few remain of those gray haired pioneers, who are looked upon as the fathers and mothers of the community.
