SAVED HORSE FROM DEATH.

Asst. Chief Crosby Rushes Into Burning Building and Leads Animal Out.

Asst. Chief Byron Crosby of the fire department, saved a horse from burning to death late yesterday afternoon when fire broke out in a barn owned by the Utah Light & Railway company, Third East between South Temple and First South street. The blaze was caused by a live wire and got a good start before being discovered.

When the assistant chief and the fire apparatus arrived several horses had been taken from the burning building but one, a dark-colored colt, not yet weaned, without considerable danger. The animal uttered cries of pain and Chief Crosby at once rushed through the tortured beast out. The animal was badly burned and lost the sight of one eye. The damage to the building is estimated at \$200.
