

and several houses adjoining south, J. Walker's charcoal factory, north of 35th Street, and a block of frame houses on Tenth Avenue between 35th and 36th Street. The steam fire engine was burned, the firemen being unable to get it out in consequence of the intense heat.

MOUNT WASHINGTON, 3.—A heavy snow storm is now prevailing. The thermometer stands at 31° at the hotels at the base of the mountains, where it is raining hard.

CHICAGO, 3.—The Times New York special gives two accounts of the battle on the Lom. One is sent from the Russian and the other from the Turkish camp, by the Herald correspondents with the respective armies.

Camp of the Turkish army, opposite Popko, August 30.

Your correspondent has just witnessed a victorious engagement for the Turkish arms. The battle commenced with the forward movement of the Turkish division of Medjed Pasha, who commanded the Turkish right, and Fuad Pasha and Sabid Pasha, whose divisions formed the centre and left. The advance by the forces under Medjed was made in gallant style. Medjed and his men pushed their way to the village of Karahassankoi, where the signal to charge was given, and with a rush they were over the Russian entrenchment on the hill. The slaughter was terrible on the Turkish side during this part of the engagement, but the men stood it nobly. The Russians were driven precipitately down the heights commanding the valley of the Lom, with great loss. Meanwhile Sabid Pasha attacked the Caschiliser, a lofty hill crowned by a three gun Russian battery. It required a very brilliant dash to carry this difficult position, but it was successfully accomplished, the guns silenced and captured, and the Russians killed or driven back in headlong haste. The attack, indeed, had been successful at all points, and the troops shouted "Allah! Allah!" with a fiery enthusiasm that told of their elation. A general advance was now ordered, and in a short time the bridge over the Lom was reached, and the Turks passed unopposed to the left bank. This victory has created the wildest enthusiasm throughout the whole army.

Headquarters 13th Russian army corps, Gagowa, Aug. 30.

On Tuesday, Gen. Leonoff, commanding the division, was reinforced by one regiment of infantry of the 35th division, with several field pieces. Rifle pits were dug and small batteries were placed on the other side of the village in preparation for the superior force of the Turks, massed in the vicinity of Rasgrad. Leonoff's force altogether numbered 3,000 infantry, with ten guns. When the Turks first advanced they were scattered by the Russian fire, and the attempt to cross the valley of the Lom was apparently abandoned. Suddenly the cries of the Turks appeared on all sides, and after a hot fire they occupied the position held ten minutes before by the Russian guns. For two hours obstinate fighting ensued, the enemy's artillery and infantry appearing in large numbers. A surrender of the Russian position was seen to be inevitable. At four o'clock the whole line suddenly retreated. The retreating ranks made a stand at the valley of Karahassankoe.

The valley to the right was swarming with Circassians. The 13th corps, coming over the hills, took the reserve position. No further service was attempted. Before sunset the fields surrounding Karahassankoi were filled with black masses of the Turkish army, whose presence promised a renewal of the attack in the morning. Thus the contest ends, the Turks partly victorious and the Russians holding their ground. Cool judges estimate the odds against the Russians at six to one. We probably have 200 killed and wounded. It is a grim consolation that there is no living Russian within the Turkish lines. On Friday morning further reports advanced the number of Russians killed and wounded in yesterday's battle to 500 men. As the courier leaves with this dispatch for Bucharest the infantry and cavalry are moving into line.

CINCINNATI, 3.—Simon Garnet, the negro who committed a rape upon the person of Mrs. Perry Kingrey, wife of a farmer, near Oxford, Ohio, on Saturday last, was taken out of jail to-day, at noon and shot dead by a mob.

SAN FRANCISCO, 3.—An Auburn dispatch says, a fire, yesterday

morning, destroyed the Chinese quarters and a number of business houses and residences on Sacramento Street. The loss is upwards of \$75,000, insurance light. The citizens are considering the expediency of preventing the rebuilding of Chinatown in the old location.

A Salinas City dispatch says, the round house of the Monterey and Salinas Valley Railroad was burnt last night; loss \$25,000; supposed incendiary.

# FOREIGN

LONDON, Canada, 1.—A steam threshing machine exploded its boiler to-day in Westminster township, making a complete wreck of the machine and all the surroundings. Five men were badly scalded and mutilated. John Morden died soon after the accident. Two others cannot live. The safety valve had been tied.

HALIFAX, 1.—At Glace Bay, Cape Breton, last night, two men named McLeod and Ferguson were shot by Archibald Boutillier, while attempting to rob his dairy. Ferguson was killed and McLeod badly wounded. Boutillier is arrested.

NIAGARA FALLS, 1.—A gentleman apparently about 75 years old, who registered at the International Hotel as L. M. Stein, M. D., New York city, suicided, to-day, by jumping from the new suspension bridge, 170 feet, into the river below. He rose to the surface a moment and then disappeared. He is said to have had considerable money on his person.

LONDON, 3.—A special, dated Boredin, August 29th, says, the Russians had evacuated Selvi.

It is believed that the Russian division, with two Rumanian corps, will operate against Widdin and Sofia.

A special from Batoum announces that the Turks have begun to evacuate Sukum Kaleh.

A correspondent with the Czarovitch's army says of Thursday's battle, that Gen. Leonoff, who commanded at Karasan, had about 3,000 infantry, 500 cavalry, and ten guns. No less than 10,000 Turks formed the advance. It was an odds of six to one for eight hours, before the Russians left the village, and the firing was almost continuous during the whole day. After the Turks had entered a portion of the village the Russian infantry held their grounds for two hours, awaiting reinforcements. At length 300 came, and two hours more hot firing ensued, during which the Turks were continually being reinforced by masses of troops. It was long since certain that we must lose our position, but the retreat did not begin fairly until 4 o'clock, the fighting having commenced at 8 o'clock in the morning, when from all along the line came suddenly back exhausted infantrymen. The only remark passed was, "There are too many." Gen. Leonoff and his staff were indefatigable in their exertions. When the retreat began it was an ugly one. From one little rise to another we went each time, until the fire was too hot for us, and at last, when the great body of the Circassians hovered upon our right flank in the maize fields below, our Cossacks and Hussars were sent down to meet them. Our position finally yielded, and we straggled back to Gagovo, such of the wounded as could manage to crawl away did so, while the infantrymen bore back the others on their rifles. We gave up our horses to the wounded officers, and finally gathered a few hundred of us at the foot of a hill along the winding road which leads to Karasan. The result of the loss at Karasan is not important, unless the enemy succeeds in forcing the heights we now hold. The Czarovitch's army is necessarily divided into small masses, at different places along the whole line of the front, from Giurgero to Tirnova and a speedy concentration is impossible—first, from the want of troops; second, on account of great distances and narrow roads. Our present position is an admirable one, we stand, of course, strictly on the defensive. This correspondent estimates the Russian loss at 5,000 killed and wounded in battle.

The Turks acknowledge the loss of 7,000 men in the Schipka Pass. Two thousand wounded reached Adrianople yesterday.

Intelligence received from the Schipka Pass states, that Suleman Pasha has gained a more advantageous position for his batteries on the heights surrounding Fort Nicholas. Russian reinforcements arrived during the night. The

roads to Gobrova has been cannonade by Turkish batteries.

The London World says that if the Canadians were to set up a monarchy all by themselves, they would elect Lord Dufferin king. We know Duff has certain royal qualifications. His yacht is withheld just at present for debt.
