He was told also that his request had been out of place, inasmuch as it suggested a violation of the law, "Secy. Hitchcock should not take 30 minutes in telegraphing an order to the territory to permit the allotments to Washington, Dec. 19 .-- Admitting that they had no authority of law for the withdrawal from allotment of nearly \$,000,000 acres of land belonging to the five civilized tribes in the Indian Territory for the purpose of creating a forest reservation, two members of the president's cabinet-Secy, Hitchcock of the department of the interior and Secy. Wilson of the agricultural departmentendeavored today to justify their course by stating they had the best interests of the indians at heart.

The purpose was not stated publicly at the time, but it developed during earlier inquiries by the commit-tee that the department of agriculture planned to create a forest reserve within the withdrawn lands which mend constain about 1500.000 acres. would contain about 1,500,000 acres. These lands would have to be purchased from the Indians under some plan yet to be presented, and an ap-propriation by Congress would be re-quired. The committee determined to call for an explanation from the heads of the two executive departments re-sponsible for the withdrawal.

Washington, Dec. 19.-In explaining the government attitude in the suit of Kansas to compel Colorado to submit to division of the waters of the Arkansas river for irrigation purposes, now under argument in the supreme court of the United States, Solit or General Hoyt today made an argument in sup-port of fiational interference in state

matters. The extreme Colorado claim, based on her sovereignty, must fall," he said, because she is a sovereign state and sovereign nation." He added:

"In the last analysis the claim means the right to make war, which was sur-rendered by the states along with the power of compact. The very fact that the controversy is justifiable in this court is proof that a state has not such absolute right to do what she pleases with what she conceives to be her

He then referred to the police power of the several states, but contended that where there is, as in this state, a onflict of authority, the national government should compose the differen

ernment should compose the difference. True, there is no federal police power, but if there is no federal power, there is no power at all. He proceeded: "There is a sovereign power in the nation here, not enumerated, but not denied, and not reserved to the states, because from its yeary nature it could because from its very nature it could not be denied; it has never been sup-posed that the power had been acted upon all things and things in their bor-ders. Exactly the reverse is true. That was the very pretension of danger which all the states wished to put down through their own government. But some power at this point is essential. If it does not exist, we are in a vise-

"In the nature of things, the state cannot have this power, being the pow-er, when by its necessary effects it passes beyond its own powers. Here are two opposed state systems of law, and their effects do not cease at the state line, but mutually intersect and inter-act and pass over into other states. Federal administration and control of irrigation on interstate streams as a matter of inherent sovereignty would not encroach on the powers reserved to the states or the people. The powers the states or the people. The powers reserved to the states are powers confined wholly to their respective borders. The powers reserved to the people re-late, I think, to possible encroachments on their personal and individual rights of life, liberty and pursuit of happiness.

Root's recent speech on the subject of the rights of states, agreeing with a suggestion by Justice Harlan that the secretary had been misunderstood. "The secretary's crimisunderstood. His position is that the states should awake to their responsibility-that there should be greater state rights, not less.'
