

## THE PRESIDENT OF PERU.

A Chat With Him In His Palace in Lima About His Country  
and the Monroe Doctrine.

Lima, Peru, April 27, 1918.

It was in company with Mr. Richard H. Nead, the secretary of our legation at Lima, that I called upon the president this afternoon. His residence is at 227 n. m. for the audience, and at that hour we entered the vast, low, one-story building which forms the White House and government offices of Peru. The president wore a uniform of white duck, with guns at their sides, guarded the doors, and as we entered the hall we passed by a company of infantry ready for immediate action. The president and the admiral stood in racks against the walls, and my surroundings were those of a fortress rather than a country residence. The president appeared to be a man of about 40 years of age. This is, I know, a time of revolutions. President Pío Urteaga came in after many months of hard fighting, and in the houses and churches of Lima you could see the bullet holes and the bullet wounds.
