ITEMS.

THEATRICAL.—That portion of the theatrical company who have been south, will give a performance in the Theatre on Saturday night, when a fine variety bill will be presented. "Evadne, or the Hall of Statues," will be the opening piece. It was as Colonna that Mr. McKenzie first stepped into the leading position he has since so ably filled. Mr. Lindsay makes a good Ludovico; Miss Adams, as Evadne, will, we have no question, present a very fine impersonation; Miss Alexander will assume the not very thankful role of Olivia; Mr. Hardie will appear as Vicentio; and Mr. Thompson as the King.

The play will be followed by a dance by Miss Alexander, and comic song by Mr. Bowring. The roaring farce of "Don't Judge by Appearances," will conclude the performance; making bill that for excellence and variety should attract a good house.

Captain Croxall's Brass Band have kindly volunteered their services, and will discourse most excellent and eloquent music on the occasion.

THE MAILS.—A small through mail from the west arrived last night, but there was no Sacramento mail matter in it. The roads west must still be difficult of passage. There has been no mail from the east since the night of the 23d, the waters of Bitter Creek being so high that the mail could not cross.

INDIANS IN ARIZONA.—Arizona is afflicted with a renewal of Indian hostilities. Apaches, Wallapais, and other tribes, are on the "war path," making raids wherever and whenever opportunity offers. The last number of the Arizona Miner that has come to hand, has a more than ordinary amount of matter concerning Indians. Accounts of raids, views with regard to the best method of dealing with the savages, and notes of the vigilance exercised to guard against attack. The Miner, while maintaining that the Apaches are treacherous and will not abide a treaty, admits that it is easier and perhaps cheaper to feed them than to fight them. An Indian would evidently stand a poor show within sight of some of the locations of the whites, judging by the following:—

"Sergeant Wortman, with whom we had a conversation the other day, informed us that ten cavalrymen are detailed daily at Camp Whipple, with orders to be ready, at a moment's warning, to jump into their saddles and pursue Indians, should they be seen anywhere in this vicinity, prowling about the ranches. The horses are kept saddled, cooked provisions are always in readiness, and the Sergeant says everything is so fixed that no time need be wasted in making a start after the red devils, when an alarm is given. This is as it should be, and goes to show that the military at Whipple are imbued with the right spirit."

FROM BEAR LAKE VALLEY.—By letters from Elder C. C. Rich, to his son Joseph C., we learn of Bro Rich's arrival at his home in Paris, Bear Lake Valley. On the Thursday evening after leaving this city he reached Franklin, and started to cross the mountains on Friday morning, accompanied by John and Thomas Rich and four others, making seven in all. They reached the foot of the main mountain about nine at night, and the summit at midnight, where Bro. Rich and three others remained all night in a shanty the remaining three traveling on, and reaching home a little after sun rise. At day light Bro. Rich and those with him resumed their journey, and were met by a number of sleighs and a body of horsemen, at Bloomington Common, who escorted Bro. Rich home. He arrived in Paris about 1 o'clock in the afternoon, very tired. The winter had been mild for that region, sheep and cattle having wintered out and done well. A severe storm set in about the close of the second week in March, which continued for several days, and left a heavy deposit of snow; but as the weather was soft, it was expected the snow would soon all melt. Bro. Rich had visited most of the settlements in the county since his return, had held meetings, and had found a good spirit manifested by the people, though there is not a superabundance of breadstuffs among them. Quite a number of Indians were in the valley, and peaceable.

TENTH WARD LECTURES.—Last night Elder W. Willes delivered a very interesting lecture, to a crowded audience, in the 10th Ward Meeting House. His discourse was a practical one, and was listened to with much attention.

RETURNING.—President R. Young left Provo this morning at twenty minutes past eight; arrived in American Fork at twenty minutes to eleven; and left there immediately after for the city. He was expected to arrive about five o'clock when this item was received from the operator here.

Spring.—The storm of the past few days has cleared away, and Spring has come, apparently, in all its warmth and beauty. "The sun is tickling the earth to make it laugh vegetation, flowers, garden peas and early truck."
