Bank Robbery.

Chicago, 29.—Edward N. Welsh,
arrested three or four days ago in
New York for robbing the First Na-

tional Bank of Kewanee, Ill., passed
through this city this evening en-

route for Kewanee, in charge of the
detective who arrested him. The

detective agency which has charge
of the case, says he made a confes-

sion, the effect of which was that
J. S. Smith, a detective, formerly a

resident of Kewanee, planned the
robbery, though he took no direct

part in it; that Pratt, the acting
cashier, was a party to it, and in-

stead of the large sum in gold which
was missing, being carried away in a

valise with the other money, it was
Pratt who carried it off previous to

the robbery, and his companions
locked Pratt and Miss Harris in the

vault and carried away the remain-

der, mostly in paper money. Welsh
refused to give the names of the

men who helped him in the job.

Kewanee, Ill., 29.—Great excite-

ment exists over the arrest of Pratt,
the cashier of the First National

Bank, on the charge of complicity
in the recent robbery, in which the

thieves got away with \$25,000. The
arrest is just made, and the detec-

tives claim to have plenty of evi-

dence to sustain the charge.

Inspection Passenger Steamers.

Washington, 29.—Secretary Pol-

lock has under his consideration the
best plan of carrying out the pro-

visions of sections of the revised
statutes, applicable to the inspection

of foreign passenger steamers, in-

cluded in an amendment to section

4,400 of revised statutes, approved

August 7th, 1882. The first step to

be taken is the appointment of six

special inspectors of foreign pas-

senger ships, of which number six are

for duty in New York, two at Bos-

ton, two at Baltimore, two at Phil-

adelphia, two at New Orleans and

two at San Francisco.

Speech of Ex-Senator Blaine.

Portland, 29.—Ex-Senator

Blaine delivered a political address

last night in the presence of a large

politics. In alluding to the contest

the State Council, he said: "My par-

ticular personal excuse for making

this speech publicly with the Gov-

ernor is that he is doing pre-

cisely with the Council of Maine
