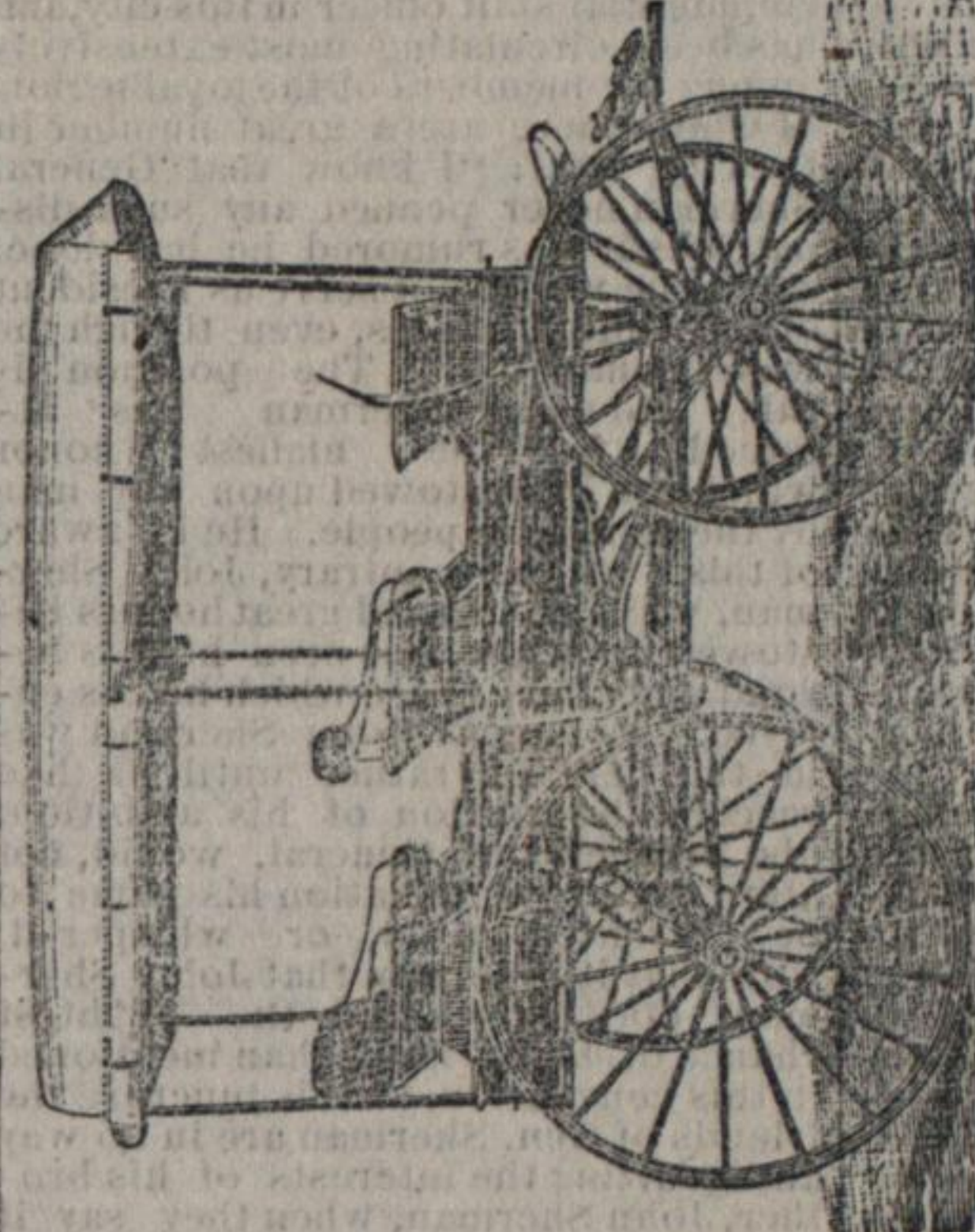

DEAR SIR.—I am the owner of a Miller Wrought Iron Range, No. 18, with elevated oven shelf, which I purchased from you and consider it just capital.
