## CONGRESSIONAL.

### HOUSE.

Chicago Relief-Trade of the United States-Indian Appropriation-Extension of Patents-Education-Fisheries-College of William and Mary.

Finckleberg presented a memorial against the passage of the Chicago relief bill.

On motion of Lynch, the secretary of the treasury was asked to give information as to tonnage, &c. with respect to the trade of the United States for the year 1870, with foreign countries.

The Indian appropriation bill was taken up, and the amendment adopted that no payment shall be made to hostile tribes, and that deductions for Indian depredations are to be made. The bill then passed.

Several bills for extension of patents were passed, and the house took up the bill to establish an educational fund, and apply the proceeds of public lands to education. McHenry made a speech against the bill.

The house committee on foreign affairs, to-day, decided to report to the house a bill providing for carrying out the clauses on the subject of fisheries contained in the treaty of Washington, but without any recommendation in relation to it.

Pierce introduced a bill to pay the college of William and Mary, in Virginia, \$50,000 for the destruction made by the late war.

A debate followed on the education bill, which was participated in by a large number of members and was mainly of a political and personal character. The principal objections urged to the bill, were that it was part of a move for centralizing all power now belonging to the States in the general government, and that it provided for mixed schools. Without action the session closed, to be renewed on Tuesday, and the house adjourned.

The session to-morrow is for general debate.

### EASTERN DISPATCHES.

New Steamboat Law—Three per cent. called in—Newspapers for the English International Exposition—Wednesday's Mail to Liverpool.

PHILADELPHIA, 2.—H. C. Camerun, who was arrested, with others, in Baltimore, for raising a mob, was not an agent of the National Life Insurance company, at the time of his arrest, but was removed a short time ago.

ALBANY, 2.—In the Assembly Alford presented a memorial of the New York bar association, making charges against certain judicial officers of New York, and asking for their resignation. Judges Barnard and Cardozo are mentioned among those whom charges were made. The memorial was referred to the judiciary committee, and power given them to go to New York to investigate.

NEW YORK, 2.—Several bankers, including Belmont, were examined to-day, by the grand jury, relative to the ring frauds.
