THE AMBITION OF HIS LIFE.

Anxious to Take a Serviceable Sea Boat Peross the Atlantic-Authorizes Declaration Repeated.

New York, May 19 .- Sir Thomas Lipton made a very important declaration in the matter of future America's cup hallenges. Dining with a former commodore of an eastern yacht club, who s well known to all Americans prominent in the sport, a short time ago in London, Sir Thomas said in the most emphatic manner to his New England yachting friend:

"I do not ever intend to challenge again for the America's cup unless the New York Yacht club rules are so hanged that I can take a serviceable a boat across the Atlantic."


