#### DRAWING ROOM IN BEE HIVE HOUSE.

The cut above shows the rear parlor in the historic Bee Hive house, formerly belonging to President Brigham Young and now occupied by President Snow. The house has entrances on the south and east and the two front halls lead into a large reception hall in the central part of the house, and from this the front and rear drawing rooms on the east, the double parlors on the west, and dining room open, with a winding stair leading to the bedchambers up stairs. The house has three stories and the rooms throughout are spacious and handsomely furnished. A feature of this is that it is constructed of native pine and carved by native artisans, and the carving on the hand rail and newel posts are of scenes on the line of the Rio Grande railway formerly the Utah Central in Parley's canyon. The principal design in the carvings in woodwork, mantles, etc., is the bee hive.
