City Council Proceedings.—Tues-  
day evening, Feb. 3d.  
Petition of J. H. Hyde & Co.,  
asking auctioneer's license. Grant-  
ed.

Petition of H. O. Fullmer, re-  
questing leave to occupy Seventh  
West street, between Eighth and  
Ninth South streets, and portions of  
other unopened streets; and Peti-  
tion of Jesse West, asking leave to  
occupy Eighth West street, be-  
tween Seventh and Eighth South  
streets, and portions of other streets  
in same locality. Both referred to  
Committee on Streets and Alleys.

A note received from D. R. Pat-  
ten & Co., inviting the Mayor and  
Council to dine at the Walker  
House this (Wednesday) evening,  
was read, and the invitation ac-  
cepted. The note alluded to recent  
improvements at the hotel named.

Mr. McKean, superintendent of the  
Inmate Asylum, presented his  
bill for \$421.35, for expenses of that  
institution during the month of  
January, which was referred to the  
Committee on Claims.

The bill of the supervisor of  
streets, for the quarter ending De-  
cember 31st, 1873, was reported cor-  
rect by the committee to whom it  
was referred, and the report was  
adopted.

The agent of the City was in-  
structed to deed to the City, in its  
corporate name, all land which he  
held as agent.

A report of the cases tried by Al-  
derman Clinton during January  
was submitted by him, and placed  
on file.

A report of the money spent dur-  
ing January by the City Marshal,  
and Chief Engineer of the fire de-  
partment, amounting to \$359.50,  
was referred to the Committee on  
Claims.

The bill for police services for  
January, amounting to \$1,147, was

read and the amount appropriated.  
Bill for boarding City prisoners  
in January, at the rate of fifteen  
cents a meal, \$324.55, was read, ap-  
proved and amount appropriated.

The Police Superintendent received  
instructions to lay plank crossings  
from the Theatre to the "Foot-  
lights" office corner, and on Second  
South Street, across West Temple  
Street, and to improve the condi-  
tion of some portions of First South  
and East Temple Streets.

Bill of Salt Lake City Gas Com-  
pany, for gas, fixtures, pipe-laying,  
etc., amounting to \$4,880.22, was  
referred to the Committee on  
Claims.

Petition of Henry Britton, ask-  
ing leave to put a plank walk  
across the street, opposite the Over-  
land House, was granted, the im-  
provement to be made under the  
direction of the Supervisor of  
Streets.

The following communication was  
read:

"SALT LAKE CITY,"  
Feb. 3, 1874.  
"To the Mayor and City Council of  
Salt Lake City:

"GENTLEMEN:—The undersigned,  
an executive committee of eleven,  
appointed by a committee of forty-  
five, from the non-Mormon voters  
and tax-payers of Salt Lake City,  
to demand an investigation and en-  
quire into the accounts of the City  
government, pertaining to the  
City funds, do hereby request  
the City Council to examine in full,  
and taking such copies as they may  
wish of the City assessment roll,  
City license account, Treasurer's  
and Auditor's books, reports of all  
exclusive franchises and charters  
granted by the City Council, re-  
ports of monies collected and dis-  
bursed on account of water works,  
with the amount of the City's li-  
abilities and public property.

"In pursuance of the above ob-  
ject we ask your honor to grant our  
request, and order the City of-  
ficers, namely, the City Recorder,  
Auditor, Treasurer, Assessor and  
Collector, in charge of the public  
records, to grant us the right to  
make such copies as we desire for a  
complete and thorough investiga-  
tion of the affairs of Salt Lake City,  
at the expense of the committee.

"Trusting you will give us the  
answer on or before Wednesday,  
Feb. 4th inst. We remain,  
"Very respectfully,  
"H. Walker, chairman; Thomas  
H. Bates, Secretary; Louis Cohen,  
Saml. Kahn, George Steell, W. P.  
Appley, R. H. Robertson, H. W.  
Lawrence, Thos. D. Brown, C. C.  
Clements, et. N. Baskin."

The communication was referred  
to the City Auditor, with an early  
day, give his opinion as to whether  
or not the Council had the power  
or right to grant the request, and  
the City Recorder was instructed  
to notify the correspondents of this  
action of the Council.

Charged with Swindling.—It will  
be remembered that the residence  
of Mr. Hans N. Charlson, 10th Ward,  
was destroyed by fire about the  
beginning of last Summer. It ap-  
pears that the premises were in-  
sured to the extent of \$2,000 to a  
Chicago fire insurance company,  
and that Mr. Charlson sold the in-  
surance policy to one William C.  
Blackwood, who gave the policy  
over to Mr. John H. McCutcheon.  
The company granted \$1,500 on the  
policy for loss sustained by the fire  
alluded to.

This afternoon, Mr. McCutcheon  
entered a complaint against Mr.  
Charlson, before Justice Clin-  
ton, charging him with fraudu-  
lently obtaining and appropri-  
ating to his own use the above-  
mentioned \$1,500. The complaint  
states that Mr. McCutcheon handed  
the draft for the amount to Mr.  
Charlson for the latter's endorse-  
ment, and that instead of endorsing  
it, and handing it to the bank of  
Messrs. De Bell & Co., draw and  
appropriated the amount.

In accordance with the affidavit  
a warrant was at once issued for  
the arrest of Mr. Charlson on a  
charge of fraud.

printed.

atory of and supplementary to the  
charter of Beaver City," was taken

and on motion of Councillor Thatcher  
the bill was referred to the Com-  
mittee on Judiciary.

Councillor Gates presented the  
petition of A. F. Macdonald and  
200 others asking for an appropri-  
ation of \$2,000, to be applied in im-  
proving the road from the Black  
Ridge in Kane County to Harris-  
burg in Washington County.

On motion of Councillor Smith,
