CONGRESSIONAL.
SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 29.—On motion of
Forrest the Secretary of war was
referred to inquire into the expediency
of enrolling a company of
Indian scouts to serve against the
Mojaves in Oregon.
The committee by Wright, further
reducing the clerical force of
the Post Office Department was
adopted.
The amendment of Morrill, of
Utah, adopted, prohibiting the
grant of any judgment of the
Court of Claims except the claimants
were proved to be loyal.
Morrill moved to lay the motion
on the table.
Hamilton, from the committee on
mines and mining, reported a bill
to amend the mining laws.
The legislative appropriation bill
came up and Edmunds' motion of
yesterday to reconsider the adopt-
ing of Sherman's amendment, in-
creasing the salaries of certain offi-
cers, was lost, yeas 14, nays 33.
The appropriation of \$10,000 for
surveyors' clerks in the post office
was struck out on the ground that
the abolition of the franking privi-
lege would dispense with their ser-
vices.
In the Poland committee, in re-
sponse to the questions of Hale, Swain
testified that the same day that
Colfax deposited \$1,200 he purchased
a draft of \$1,000, and sent A. H.
Cann to Indianapolis.
Colfax testified that he had
made a thorough examination
of his papers and letters, upon
the conclusions of which he would
before the committee to test-
ify on his own behalf, also to ask
that some witnesses be summoned.
Colfax had requested Hale to state
to the committee that he could
show that \$1,200 were deposited by
him in the First National Bank,
and that it was derived from an-
other source than that alleged.
Judge Poland read the check drawn
by James Ames on the sergeant-at-
arms of the House of Representa-
tives for \$1,800, payable to J. W.
Patterson or bearer, dated Jan. 22,
1868, and endorsed by Patterson.

HOUSE.
WASHINGTON, 29.—The bill for
the admission of Colorado was dis-
cussed and finally tabled. It is
the committee on elections in the
Florida contest report Niblack
entitled to a seat, and he was sworn
in.
Wilson, chairman of the select
committee of the Pacific Railroad and
the Credit Mobilier investigation,
reported that James B. Stewart,
of Washington, who had been
summoned as a witness before the
committee, refused to answer cer-
tain questions as to the disposition
of a large amount of money given
him in 1864, to arrange certain diffi-
culties with other companies, but
that he refused upon the fact that
he was only acting as an attorney
for the parties, and had no right to
divulge the secrets of his clients.
The committee asked for an order
to compel the copartnership witness
by the sergeant-at-arms, and after
a long discussion, Bingham moved
to amend the order so as to have
Stewart brought before the House
for contempt, which, after further
discussion was adopted, 123 to 97,
adjourned.

EASTERN.
WASHINGTON, D. C., 29.—The
Wilson committee to-day recalled
Joseph B. Stewart, and desired him
to state concerning the sum of
\$250,000, received by him as stated
in his former testimony, in money
and bonds of the Union Pacific
Railroad, and Hallett, witness
declined to answer, saying that such
money was received as counsel.
NEW YORK, 29.—In the Tweed
case this morning, the defense an-
nounced that they would call no
more witnesses. Counsel for the
defense then asked the exclusion
from the record of all secondary
evidence admitted on trial; refused,
Patterson proceeded with the argu-
ment for the defense.
It is announced that the ar-
rangements of the syndicate for the
negotiation of the 5 per cent. fund-
ed loan have so far progressed that
the books of subscription will be
opened in Europe and America
probably as early as Tuesday, Feb.
4th, to remain open no longer than
three or four days. It is thought
the syndicate will be sufficient to
complete the entire loan.

WASHINGTON.—The Senate
committee on elections to-day fur-
ther examined Pinchback on the
Louisiana election question.
TOPEKA, Kan., 29.—Caucuses by
the Pomeroy and anti-Pomeroy men
were held last evening. The for-
mer is said to have 80 votes. The
joint ballot showed, counting 64
votes, united on John J. Ingall. It
takes 67 votes to elect.
ST. LOUIS.—Mercury has ranged
from zero to 10 below the last 30
hours.
WASHINGTON, 29.—At the sit-
ting of Polaud's committee this
morning, James Brooks appeared
and desired to make record of the
fact that the imprinted exhibit of
the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania,
January 6th, in the suit of Mc-
Cormick against the Credit Mobilier,
there was filed and sworn to by
Credit Mobilier stockholders, dated
December 12th, 1867. In that list
is Charles H. Nelson, for a hun-
dred shares and fifty shares; that
Charles H. Nelson, a resident of
Brooks became a member of
government director, it was brought
into notoriety in the highest court
of Pennsylvania; that Nelson
owned 150 shares in the Credit Mo-
bilier, and that he was president of
the Brooks also desired to record the
names of all government directors
when he was one, such names as
George Ashmun, of Massachusetts;
James C. Rollins, of Missouri; J.
L. Wilson, of Indiana; Benjamin
Wade, of Ohio, and others; and to
the facts on record in the Union
Pacific Railroad books, that these
directors generally, if not always,
were in accord with him, Brooks,
as to their duties; that during that
time John A. Dix, governor of New
York, was president of the road,
and the late Senator Morgan, of
New York, one of the trustees of
the bonds of the Company. Brooks,
who referred to the October
meeting of 1872 of the U. P. di-
rectors, when the resolution of his
for the revocation of the Wyoming
Credit Company contract was passed,
testified that he held his director-
ship a year, and never heard of the
authorization of the directors for
the issue of fifty shares additional.
He only saw it yesterday and
claimed that these fifty shares were
for Nelson, by virtue of the contract
with Durant. Had no knowledge
as to whom he paid the \$5,000
owned Nelson by Dillon, but sup-
posed Nelson did. The check given
showed no such check given.
Sidney Dillon remembered loan-
ing the \$5,000 to Nelson, who gave
an official Union Pacific stock
and bonds; supposed the money
was repaid by Nelson.
Judge Robert S. Hall, of New
York, appeared in the interests of
Schnyder Colfax and examined H.
C. Ames, in reply to a question, said
that the \$1,800 was paid for divi-
dends on thirty shares in the Credit
Mobilier. A witness also produced
the following receipt:
"Washington, February 14th,
1868.
Received of Oakes Ames \$129 for
three bonds in the U. P. R. Co.,
sold for me, being a dividend of 80
per cent. in bonds or stock of the
Credit Mobilier of America, held by
him as trustee on my account."
(Signed) J. W. PATTERSON.
Ames testified, in reply to ques-
tions, that a check of \$600 marked
"S. C." drawn by him on the ser-
geant-at-arms, June 22, 1868, was
sent to Edmunds for 60 per cent.
dividends on ten shares in the Credit
Mobilier. He thought he paid
Davies \$600 less \$200 at the same
time on the same account. Scho-
field, Dayton and Logan went out
after the dividend of 60 per cent.
