## ORDERS COME IN FOR CREOLE STOCK

### THE MARKET WAS SLUGGISH

### PLEASED WITH KEYSTONE.

Salt Lakers Like Looks of That Thaknes Canyon Mine.

E. W. Griffiths, who, with Broker Ed Sheets, made an inspection of the Keystone at Park City yesterday, came home well pleased with his observations at that property. The large triple compartment shaft, he states, has reached the depth of 200 feet and the hoisting apparatus is being pushed rapidly down to the 300 feet, where a level will be established and drift run.

"The shaft has cut a lot of fine material which looks very encouraging," said Mr. Griffiths this morning. "It has been cross-cut for a distance of about 20 feet, and in the entire length it discloses a good low grade product."

Mr. Griffiths believes that when this vein is cut lower down it will open up into something much better than anything yet disclosed in the mine.
