FATAL CANYON ACCIDENT. Bradford K. Shumway the Victim Discriminating Against Sheep.

Kanab, Kane Co., Utah, Dec. 31 .- Our holiday festivities were suspended very suddenly on the morning of the 26th by couriers coming in from the west hills with word that one of our young men, Bradford K. Shumway was seri ously, if not fatally, injured.
