#### SOUTH AFRICAN ANNEXATION

United States Recognizes England's Action in Official Documents.

Chicago, March 16.-A special to the Chronicie from Washington, says:

In the annual review of the commerce of the United States with foreign countries published by the state depart-ment, which made its appearance toment. day, the commerce of the South Afri-can republic is presented under the heading of "The Transvaal" and that of the Orange Free State under that of the "Orange River Colony" the names by which the republics have been designated by the British since their furgation. A foot note under their invasion. A foot note under each explains that the two republics have been annexed by Great Britain. This is the first public official ex-pression that the United States recog-nizes the extinction of the republics used it is also the first official vecus. and it is also the first official recog-nition given to the annexation by any of the powers. The European govern-ments have held that the annexation cannot be considered an accomplished fact until England has formally acquainted the powers of the annexation of the republics, which has not so far been done.

#### TWO HUNDRED ANIMALS.

Coming from Europe for Ban American Exposition.

New York, March 16 .- Two hundred animals consigned to a menagerie and destined ultimately to reach the Pan-American exposition have reached Baltimore according to a special to the World. They came on two steam-ers and are valued altogether at \$100,-000.4 Many of them are well trained while others are absolutely wild. Shanghai Protests Against it. New York, March 16 .-- The executive committee of the American Asiatic as-sociation has transmitted to President McKinley the protest of the American Asiatic association of Shanghai against Asiatic association of Shanghai against the Russo-Chinese agreement received some time ago. The committee accom-panies the protest with resolutions, which are, according to the preamble, framed "on the authoritative an-nouncement that there is in process of negotiation and already on the point of varification a convention between of ratification a convention between Russia and China providing for the military and administrative control of Manchuria by the former power."

The resolutions are as follows: "Se it resolved, That this committee rives its emphatic endorsement to the protest of the American association of China against the pending Russo-Chi-nese agreement as a blow aimed directly at the integrity of the Chinese empire and at the present and pros-pective interests of American trade. which depends on maintaining equality.
