The constitution and by-laws, among many other things, it is said, provide that no bank or trust company will be permitted to make any loans, large or small, for a greater rate of interest than 6 per cent, and further, that after the first day of July, 1909, no farmer will be allowed to employ any colored help on his farms and that all negroes will be notified to leave the country under penalty of death; that all mechants shall sell their goods and merchandise at not to exceed 10 per cent profit, and otherwise regulating wages to be paid by the farmer for help and to be paid by the farmer for help and regulating the price of all farm pro-

ducts.

The by-laws show that the organization comprises not only the night riders of Obion county, but includes all night rider organizations over the entire country.




