San Francisco, May 29 .- The Japane association, composed of leading Japanese residents, today made the following statement of the Japanese view of recent assaults committed against Jap anese in this city

"In the first place, the Japanese resi dents of San Francisco realize the fac that present conditions in this city make it very difficult for the authorities to extend full protection. They un-

They un-derstand that the strike upon the street railroads puts a heavy tax upon the police force and that it is impossible to guard all places at all times against the lawless elements of the community. "They are fully convinced, however, that much of the violence to which they have been subjected is due to cacled prejudice, and that the attempts which are being made in certain quarters, to have it appear that the trouble is con-fined to quarrels between laboring men, incidentally involving the Japaneße, are without foundation. ithout foundatle

## Country Could Suffer no Worse Blow



ering of judges, state and federal, did honor at the Waldorf-Astoria tonight to Federal Judge William J. Wallace. who has retired after over a quarter of a century on the bench. The dinner, attended by some 500 persons, was given by members of the "bar of the state of New York." Former Judge

Alton B. Parker presided. Those present included Judge James E. Lacome, of the United States circuit court; Wayne E. MacVeagh, of Philadelphia; J. E. Coit, of Rhode Island, and Judge Horace E. Lurton, of the Tennesse federal bench. Judge Wallace said in part;

"It is seriously proposed by a large element in one of our pollular parties and the proposition is advocated by its most conspicuous leader—one who is likely to be its candidate for the pres-idency—to abrogate the life tenure of the judges of the circuit and district courts, and to substitute an elective indiciary.

idency-to abrogate the file termine of the judges of the circuit and district courts, and to substitute an elective judiciary. "No blow more fatal than this could be aimed at all that is valuable in the existing situation. It has been pro-voked largely by the courage of these judges in restraining the lawless acts of trade unlons and in preventing the enforcement of state legislation which they believe to conflict with the guar-antees of the federal Constitution. It would be better to abolish these courts altogether. They would not be federal courts in any true sense, because the judges would be marely the selection of the localities of their jurisdiction and would reflect local influences. "The times are bear when the courts of this country are to be more than ever the sanctuary of that justice which administers the law according to the ordained principles of our form of gov-erment. The will of the majority is not law when it transcends constitu-tional limitations. In many of the states that will is now threatening the rights of the minority and has al-ready compelled legislatures, under the guise of protecting public interests to interfere with private business and to impose unusual and unnecessary re-strictions on lawful occupations. "The Republican party under its mad race with the leaders of the Dem-ocratic party to capture the votes of the discontented, the prejudiced, the unthinking and the fanatical believers in socialistic theories. Vastly the great-er number of the minority are not the millionatres but are people of moderate means who find their modest income vanishing. There are enough of these to form a party which would hold the balance of power in many states. But until such a party is formed, the only refuge from these assaults is in the courts."
