Diamondville, Wyoming, Dec. 8.-The information forwarded you and appearing in your, issue of the 7th instant was incorrect, the deputy sheriffs have attended to their duties in their duties in a becoming manner, and there was no shooting or manner, and there was no shooting or misbehavior on their part. The situation at the mines is now very quiet and much credit is due Sheriff Ward for his excellent management of the warring factions. The information sent you at a prior date was only hearsy and un-reliable, and it is to be regretted that an injustice was done Sheriff Ward. Three of the leading strikers, McAl-lister, Ross and Caspard, were placed under arrest today, charged with threatening to commit murder and in-timidating the working miners.

# MAMMOTH SUGAR FACTORY.

Next year the Utah Sugar Co.'s fac-tory at Lehi will have its capacity trebled, which means that it will work the juice from 1,000 to 1,200 tons of beets per day, the slicing at Lehi, Spring-ville and the new plant to be erected in Soft Leho winty with a simul in Salt Lake county going on simul-taneously. This seems like a preity big plant, but it is in reality about onethird the size of the great best sugar factory at Spreckles, California.

This is the largest beet sugar fac-tory in the world. It is owned by the Spreckels' Sugar Co., of which Mr. Clans Spreckels is president, and is located at Spreckels, Cal., on the bank of the Salinas river, twenty miles from the month and four miles from the ts mouth and four miles from the City of Sainas and on the Sainas Valley ailroad. The confpany owns and operates two narrow gauge roads, one o Watponville and the other to the lime or market. The factory decisions finds quarries. The factory drainage finds a ready access into the Salinas river and thence to the sea, while from above the mill a stream leaves the river and furnishes water for the washers and other coarse operations. lons are consumed daily. The buildings consist of the factory proper 582x102 ft.; boiler house, 559x68 ft.; machine shop, 559x40 ft.; oil house, pump house, warehouse, office building and beet sheds. These sheds are five a combined capacity of 20,000 tons of beets. Within each shed are two flumes, 18 inches deep at the dump and 13 feet at the factory, and between the flumes is an elevated railway to convey cars laden with beets which are dumped automatically. The main building contains all the machinery necessary for producing either the raw or refined prod-uct. There are four diffusion batteries of fourteen cells each and four sets of washers, elevators, slicers and scales to correspond. There are eight diffusion juice heaters, twelve saturation tanks, twenty-two filter, presses, two sets quadrupic effects, one double effect, um ulphur saturation tanks, seven vacuum pans, forty-eight crystalizers, seven mixers, twenty-eight centrifugals and numerous pumpe, engines, motors, tanks, elevators, etc., to correspond. Besides being lighted by electricity, the

factory is to a great extent operated by The rest of the machinery is operated by steam produced in forty-cight bollers at 125 horse power each, stationed in the boller house. These bollers consume 1,200 barrels of oil daily. The boiler house also contains the stee lime klins, which rise 30 feet through the roof, and the other apparatus for mixing and pumping the lime to the factory. The factory has a daily capacity of 3,000 tons of beets and will require the product of 30,000 acres yearly for a full run. Of this area the company will be able to supply a good portion, as it owns large ranches in both the Salinas and Pajaro valleys. The company's capital is \$5,000,000, of which the Spreckels factory represents \$2,500,000, the Watsonville\$874,000 and the ranches above mentioned, with their irrigation systems, etc., the remainder,
