HELD FOR MURDER

MAN AND WOMAN

Accusation Comes as a Result of Letter Written by Suicide H. T. McMahon.

WERE ARRESTED IN THIS CITY

Matter Shrouded in Mystery But Suspects are Held Pending an Investigation.

As a result of a strange tale and a letter written by Henry T. McMahon just before he killed himself in the Boulanger roominghouse at Ogden yesterday morning, Myrtle Huling, a woman of the town, and her lover, G. A. Lorenz, are under arrest and are in the city jail, accused of murdering a man for his money at Elko, Nev., July 16, 1904.

McMahon had been a lover of the woman, but she threw him over and took up with Lorenz. This enraged McMahon, and he swore to have revenge. He declared that the Huling woman and Lorenz intended to murder him.

Yesterday the contents of a letter written by McMahon were made known to Chief Lynch, and the arrest of the woman and her lover followed. Both maintain their innocense. The letter written by McMahon follows:

MCMAHON'S LETTER.

"When this reaches you I will be no more. I have taken the Salt Lake pa-pers and my address was at Denio, Harmy county, Oregon, and afterwards changed to Diamond, Ore. "If the chief of police in Salt Lake

would have done his duty this would not have happened. He was written to asking the description of a woman rooming at 337 south State street, but he did not answer it. He and his offi-cers must have got part of the money

the poor unfortunate one had who was murdered for me. "Myrtle Huling is the name of the woman living at 337 south State street who planned the murder and her lover, nie J. Hair the one that met her at Sacramento, July 13, 1904, the one that is with her now at 58 Commercial street, is the one who did the work. I am the man one who did the work. I am the main who bought her the house where she now is and the one her lover aimed to murder. I did not know this until I left Sait Lake last Saturday. I have defended Myrtle and if this had not happened it would have cost her her We Monday"

I met her in Bolse, Ida., last Feb.-"I met her in Boise, Ida., last Feb.-ruary and went with her to Salt Lake and roomed in No. 18 in the Montana rooming house. I left her there, but she pursuaded me to come back again in July, and it was at this time that she and her lover made it up to murder me. Hoping that you will see justice dong me I am
