Moving Prisoners to Penitentiary at Rawlins-Work on R. R. Grade.

Special Correspondence. Laramie, Wyo., Dec. 3.-Contractor Nils Callman of the Laramie, Hauhn's Peak & Pacific railroad will move his grading camps to the Little Laramie river next Friday, and the grade will be finished to the river shortly thereafter. Some trouble is experienced in getting a sufficient number of men to handle the work as winter is coming on and laborers don't like to sleep out on the prairie in a tent. The contractor says, however, that the tents are comfortable and that men that are not afraid to work have no fault to find. The wages being paid are the highest ever received by railroad graders in the West.

TRANSFERING PRISONERS.
