RUMORS CONFLICT REGARDING DEAL

Gould Officials Say Progress of Sale Has Not Been Stopped.

OTHER STORIES CURRENT.

State Press Tells of Versions of Trans. fer, but Does Not Quote Its Authority.

Despite the denials of officials here that the Rio Grande has stopped its acquisition of the Sanpete, the story is going the rounds of the state press Rio Grande officials here say the deal was completed months ago. Here is what the Mt. Pleasant Pyramid has to say about it:

A rumor, unconfirmed but originating from a reliable source, reaches the Pyramid this week to the effect that there is a hitch of ample proportions in the alleged sale of the Sanpete Valrailroad property to the Ric Grande Western company. In fact, according to the story told by this paper's informant, all negotiations are off, temporarily at least, and there is a possibility that they will not be resumed again soon, if ever.

According to this rumor the unexpected delay or cessation in the pro-

pected delay or cessation in the pro-ceedings is due to the option given on the property some time ago to a com-pany entirely separate and distinct from the Western. It will be remembered that the Fitzgerald interests sebered that the Fitzgeraid interests secured an option on the road last year for \$20,000. It was not taken up within the prescribed time, but in some way the holders of the option still claim to have an interest or hold of some kind on the road and some litteration will ensure before the matter. gation will ensue before the matter Bearing out these rumors of a hitch

in the sale proceedings are others which tell of changes recently made on the road. All of these make rather a strong chain of circumstantial evidence substantiating the rumor. One of these is a story to the effect that all construction and improvement work on the S. P. V. branch has stopped, and that nothing of the kind has been done there since the first intimation

of a hitch was received.

Another statement is that all sta-tionery now in use by employes of the road bears the old Sanpete Valley railway name, the Western paper hav-ing been retired. Yet another rumor is that the revenues of the S. P. V. branch are not turned in through the regular Western channels, as have been for several months. Every-thing of that kind goes to a Salt Lake official who is not connected with the D. & R. G. or the R. G. W. compan-ies. All of these changes have gone into effect within the past week or so. Information concerning them comes Information concerning them comes from an employe of the road, and is probably reliable. It is difficult to understand what they signify if the sale to the Western people has been consummated and final transfer made, as has been supposed was the case, of if there has been no hitch in the proceedings.

Mrs. Agnes E. Pease, who cast the third woman's vote ever cast in the State of Utah, is in San Francisco set ting local club women in a whirl of excitement to know how it feels to experience the same sensation, and it voting the first time has any of the sensation of walking up the alse to get married or of wearing a princess gown for the first time without a coat—the two great ordeals of modern femininity. The San Francisco Chronicle says:

"Mrs. Pease herself is more interested

n San Francisco, whether women vote in sun Francisco, whether women vote or do not vote here. She addressed the Suffrage Amendment league of Oakland a day or so ago and told all about women in politics in Utah, and when she sat down she was overwhelmed with quiries of "how it felt."

"It is not half as exciting as standing in line to buy theater tickets," Mrs. Pease explained. "You simply walk

ing in line to buy theater tickets," Mrs. Pease explained. "You simply walk into a booth and cast a vote, and no one jostles you or insults you, or crowds you out of the way, and the men voters are much more gentlemanly toward a woman than they are while buying theater tickets or on street cars."

Dealers of This City Call Attention to The Laxity of Inspec. tion.

Salt Lake City is the dumping Salt Lake City is the dumping ground for the worst class of meats in the United States, according to the declaration of prominent meat dealers in this city. The dealers claim that the law requiring all meats to be inspected by government inspectors is not enforced, and the natural result is that all kinds of putrid and objectionable meats are shipped in with impunity.

The following letter on the subject has been submitted to the license in-spector of Salt Lake City, and by him to the city council and explains the matter from the standpoint of the

Sail Lake City is, at the present time, a dumping ground for probably the worst class of meats that are sold in any city in the United States, for the reason of the laxity of putting into effect the inspection law. For your information we beg to say that the inspection law now existing in certain plants that are putting meats on the Sait Lake market, the government inspector being installed, and where the inspector's stamp is placed on the meats it is evidence to the consuming public that the meats have been passed upon for health by the federal inspector; but the federal inspector sees only a small portion of the meats that are sold in Sait Lake City for food. For instance, meats are shipped into this city by express every day, by farmers, speculators and butchers, consigned in many instances to com-Salt Lake City is, at the present into this city by express every day, by farmers, speculators and butchers, consigned in many instances to commission men, who make a business to sell to anybody who will buy—retail ers, hotels and restaurants, or whoers, hotels and restaurants, or whoever desires to buy. But in many instances the goods are shipped direct
to the retail market. Every express
wagon brings in meats every day,
some of it good and some of it
questionable, and some of it that ought
not to be permitted to be used for
food. We believe that there is now
sufficient law to protect the consuming public against unprincipled dealers, and also to protect legitimate men.
Therefore, we say that we shall be glad
to meet with the proper autority, if
it is desired, and aid in the devising of
