## COOK PASSES CAPE SKAGEN

Steamer Bearing Discoverer of  
North Pole Reaches Northern  
Extremity of Denmark.

### GREAT GAIN TO KNOWLEDGE.

Sir Robert Ball, Astronomer at  
Cambridge University, Tells  
What Discovery Means.

Mrs. Peary Says Doctor Will Have to  
Bring Back Some of Peary's Rec-  
ords to Prove His Claims.

Seago, Denmark, Sept. 2.—A news-  
paper correspondent who went on board  
the Hans Egede from the pilot steamer  
of Dr. Cook was able to obtain a few words  
with Dr. Frederick A. Cook. The ex-  
plorer assured his success to the fact  
that he made use of the old methods,  
namely, Eskimos and dogs, and that he was  
able to confirm them.

#### EXPEDITION CAREFULLY PLANNED.

While the first reports indicated that  
the "dash for the pole" was the unpre-  
dicted outcome of a fishing and  
hunting trip along the Labrador coast,  
Mr. Bradley now states that this was  
not true and that Dr. Cook's expedition  
was perhaps the most carefully planned  
of any previous polar attempt. Mr.  
Bradley states that the plan contained  
as to the ultimate object of the trip,  
because, had Dr. Cook failed,  
much unpleasant controversy could be  
avoided. Not even the captain of the  
schooner-yacht which took the party to  
the northwest coast of Greenland  
and that he had a Polar expedition  
until others were given their share,  
Greenland, to put Dr. Cook and the  
supplies ashore.

The fact is that Joseph Lippman and  
H. G. McMillan want to be  
mayor. Each, according to his own  
notion, is the only man who can suc-

**SEEKS TO GET BRANFORD.**

The move is that Joseph Lippman  
is to offer his services to the party  
and upon John S. Branford, the  
nomination for mayor, which he has  
said he does not want. However, with  
the clamorings of the two warring  
factions and the formation of a line of  
opposition going on which the "American"  
party has never been seen before,  
they face the "split" feelings  
attracting to some of the members  
of "American" ranks would seem to be  
well founded, and their cause for  
alarm very real.

**GROWING IN FAVOR.**

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**PROF. LOEB SAYS LIFE  
IS A CHEMICAL FUNCTION.**

Budapest, Sept. 2.—At the medical  
congress here tonight Prof. Jacques  
Loeb of California university, lectured  
on artificial parthenogenesis and  
formation stimulation, in which he de-  
scribed his experiments in the fertiliza-  
tion of eggs of marine animals. He  
considered life itself to be a chemical  
function and sees no reason why life  
cannot be established in dead water.

**ADmiral SPERRY RETIRED.**

Washington, Sept. 2.—At the age of 63  
years, Rear Admiral E. S. Perry was  
placed on the retired list of the navy today.

His admiral is now engaged with the  
Newport conference at the war college  
there and will continue there until he  
has completed work which he has  
been assigned.

The admiral's last command was  
that of the Atlantic fleet, which he  
had been assigned to the Pacific fleet  
and which he has been assigned to the
