# ISSUED ORDERS TO JUDGES.

Removed Them Against Bar's Protest When They Did Not Comply With The Laws as Modified by Him.

Washington, Dec. 3 .- The senate Washington, Dec. 3.—The senate committee on military affairs today resumed its hearing in connection with charges filed against Gen, Leonard Wood in opposiation to his confirmation to be major general. The first witness was Melville E. Stone, general man-ager of the Associated Press.

M. E. STONE TESTIFIES.

Mr. Stone wase questioned concerning Mr. Stone wase questioned concerning the report that Gen. Wood had sought to retain E. G. Bellairs as the representeative of the Assiciated Press at Havana. He submitted a letter writ-ten by Maj. Runcle to Col. Charles s. Diehl, assistant general manager of the Associated Press, which requested, in behalf of Gen. Wood, the reten-tion of Bellairs, saying it was impor-taut to have a man representing the Associated Press at Havana who was in the confidence of the militury gov-ernor. Mr. Stone said the matter was then under the chage of Col. Diehi, Bellairs was retained, but his previous record was not known to the officers of the Associated Press. When it became the Associated Press. When it became known Bellairs was discharged.

Mr. Stone was also asked as to what knowledge Gen. Wood had of Bel-lair's record, but upon this point he could give the committee little informa-tion. It was decided that Col. Dichl should be gubnesued chould be subpoenaed.

#### RAY STANNARD BAKER.

Ray Stannard Baker, the man who Maj. Runcle said was at the dinner with Gen. Wood and himself when the proposed magazine article criticis-Brooke was discussed, was the next witness.

BAKER CLOSELY QUESTIONED.

Mr. Baker was questioned closely by Senator Scott of the committee, and by Senators Hanna and Teller, who were present. They quoted Maj. Run-cle's letter to Baker suggesting that cle's letter to Baker suggesting that the time was opportune for the publi-cation of the Runcle article in Gen. Wood's interest, and asked him if the letter did not show that there had been conferences on the subject and a per-fect understanding. Mr. Baker admit-ted that appearances would lead to that inference but insisted there had not been ony understanding. been any understanding.

BROOKE WAS DISCUSSED.

Mr. Baker admitted that he and Wood and Runcie had discussed Gen. Brooke's administration of Cuban af-fairs, but said the discussion had been impersonal, and that Brooke's name had not been mentioned. He also said that Gen. Wood had introduced him to Run-
