NO SMALLPOX IN WALES.

State Land Commissioner Rees Says **Published Statements are False.**

"We have no smallpox in Wales, Sanpete county, the published statement in both the morning dailles to the contrary, notwithstanding," said State Land Commissioner Rees to the "News" today. "Furthermore," he continued,

During the year, 82 merchants who had formerly been doing business without a license in Salt Lake county were waited upon by myself and deputies, and forced to procure license or suspend business. During the same period there has been collected by my office and turned into the county treas. ury, on account of delinquent merchants' license, approximataely \$500; and from owners of personal property upon which the tax for 1898 was de-

linquent, the sum of \$200.

"The sanitary condition of the county outside of the limits of Salt Lake City has received our constant attention. Contagious diseases among stock when ever reported have been looked into and the disease kept under control. Patrolmen have been provided for the protection of the interests of the citizens living in or adjacent to the canyons, and during the season of the passing of the sheep from the valley to the mountains I have had a deputy accompany them through the canyons for the purpose of guarding against a pollution of the waters or trespass upon private property. ESCAPES AND DEATH.

During the year there were two escapes from the county jail, as follows: Holden O'Connor, serving a term of 20 days on charge of disturbing the peace escaped -----, 1899. He had an unfinished sentence standing against him of seven days. John Doe Anderson, serving a term of 120 days on charge of petit larceny, escaped -----1899. He had an unfinished sentence of 30 days standing against him. One death occurred at the county fail dur-ing the year, to wit: John Y. Smith, died Sunday, December 17th, 1899, from ceffets of morphine poisoning administered by his own hand. "In conclusion I desire to thank the
