THE news from Long Branch today is the most unfavorable yet received of the President.

A RULING IN FAVOR OF DISORDER.

ONCE more the influence of the Third District Court has been exercised in favor of the local authorities in their efforts to control it.

regulation and convenience of the inhabitants of this city? The number of those who would answer "no" to this question are without doubt very few and insignificant.

As to the amount of license fee that it takes to make it a tax, His Honor leaves us in the dark. The City Charter in section 41 makes the fee discretionary with the City Council. That body is made the judge of the sum necessary. The Supreme Court of Nebraska, recently, in full bench, unanimously ruled that a license fee of one thousand dollars per annum was not excessive, and was not a tax within the meaning of the law.

We should be sorry to misjudge or falsely accuse any one, but, as the Lord lives and Satan works to oppose him, we believe these movements in opposition to the local laws and the expressed wishes of the large majority of the people to be inspired by the desire we have mentioned, the ultimate end being to sow the seeds of division, discord, strife and demoralization, for the breaking up of the institutions of the Latter-day Saints. But just as firm as are our convictions of this intent, so sure are we that the plan will fail and will result in shame and confusion to those who thus plan for evil and lend their aid to work injury, when they should labor to put down vice and establish righteousness and peace in the earth.

This decision should be tested in a court where there is some knowledge of the law and some chance of a just ruling.

THE TERRITORIAL FAIR.

The Territorial Fair will be held in the old City Market and grounds and the ample grounds east of the market premises and the area south of the Museum.

This will give exhibitors in all the departments ample facilities for the display of their exhibits, much superior to those of any other Fair.

All exhibits except live stock and perishable articles, should be on the Fair grounds by 9 p. m. Saturday, October 1st. Live stock should be on the grounds before 10 o'clock Monday morning, Oct. 3d.

In lieu of charging \$2.00 membership, as heretofore, the directors have adopted the measure of retaining 25 per cent. on all the premiums awarded by the Society, except diplomas. This has no reference to special premiums.

All persons intending to exhibit horses, cattle, sheep or swine, will please notify A. M. Musser, secretary, on or before Monday, September 25th, of the number and kind of animals they propose to exhibit, so that the Committee on Fair Grounds may know how many stalls, sheds and pens to construct. Any person failing to comply with this request must not expect sheds, stalls or pens prepared for their animals when they bring them on the ground. Owners of stallions, bulls, or other animals that may be in any manner unsafe, must see that they are properly secured and attended to.

Arrangements have been made with the Utah Central and Northern for special rates over their respective lines to the Fair and back. The Central will place one car at Ogden and one at Price for transportation of all kinds of exhibits at the Fair, except live stock, and will take a cash freight at all the stations on the route free of charge.

LOGAN, Sept. 17, 1911. "Will make half rates for round trip on articles shipped from points on Utah and Northern to Ogden, to be exhibited at the Fair. Freight will be charged at regular tariff on all articles going down, all of same returned will be billed free to points of shipment."

Admission to the Fair and Museum will be: Adults, 25 cents; children under 12 years, 10 cents.

An address by one of our prominent citizens will be delivered at the opening of the Fair, at noon, Monday, October 3d.

Six hundred free tickets are to be distributed to the poor, without distinction, under the direction of the Presiding Bishop, Edward Hunter.

Life members will please hand their names, with the evidence of their membership, to the Secretary, A. M. Musser, on the Fair grounds.

CHILD-OCEANA Bulletin. ELBERON, 19, 9:15 a.m.—The condition of the President this morning continues unfavorable.
