

## WITNESSES SPIRITED AWAY

Their Evidence Very Important  
to Prosecution in the Pat-  
rick Calhoun Case.

### AGENTS SEARCHING FOR THEM

They Are Atty. John O'Neill and His  
Brother Hugh and One  
E. A. Platt.

San Francisco, May 25.—Detectives employed by the prosecution and detectives employed by the defense were the only witnesses called during the day's session of the trial of Patrick Calhoun, president of the United Railroads. Luther Brown, who admitted that he directed the activities of several assistants working in the interests of the defense, was finally interrogated as to his relations with men who have confessed to complicity in the theft of papers from the office of W. J. Burns, agent of the prosecution, and refused to testify on the ground that his statements might tend to incriminate him.

Norman Melrose, another attaché of the United Railroads detective bureau, said that he had delivered to William M. Abbott, jointly indicted with Mr. Calhoun, reports procured by men under his direction.

Nicholas Korngold, the third witness of the day, declared he had followed Dist. Atty. W. H. Langdon, with two detectives and John Claudianes, to the home of James L. Gallagher, which had been wrecked by an explosion of dynamite. He declared that Abbott had commended him for his work, and had instructed him to ascertain, if possible, what had transpired in the grand jury room in Oakland when Claudianes was indicted in connection with the dynamiting. The witness said that he had been directed by Abbott to establish relations with the family of Felix Paudevers, who was accused of complicity in the affair, but has never been apprehended.

All the testimony of the day was offered, according to Mr. Heney, in an effort to show that Mr. Calhoun and Mr. Abbott were engaged in a conspiracy to defeat the ends of justice and suppress evidence. It is believed that the prosecution is nearing the end of its case, but under the most favorable circumstances it is improbable that the arguments to the jury will be reached within a week.

It was announced by the prosecution today that Atty. John O'Neill and his brother, Hugh, together with E. A. Platt, all witnesses in the Calhoun case, had disappeared. Agents of the district attorney's office are searching for them. The O'Neill brothers are accused of having attempted to prevent the appearance of Detective John Helms as a witness for the prosecution. Platt was arrested several weeks ago on a charge of grand larceny and accused of having delivered papers from the office of W. J. Burns to the defense. At that time he was a confidential assistant to Burns.

### NATIONAL HOLIDAYS.

When They Fall on Sunday the Following Monday is to be Observed.

Washington, May 25.—President Taft today issued an executive order directing that when national holidays fall on Sunday all government employees entitled to a holiday should be granted leave on the Monday following. In states where the state laws provided for celebrations on the Saturday preceding holidays falling on Sunday, government employees will be granted leave on Saturday.

## JULIA WARD HOWE, NINETY YEARS OLD, HER GREAT-GRANDCHILD AND NAMESAKE



Women suffragists in all parts of the country have prepared a big celebration to mark the ninetieth birthday of Mrs. Julia Ward Howe, on May 27. Mrs. Howe was born in New York City, in 1810. Her father's house in Bowling Green was the meeting place of the literary folk of that time—Washington Irving, William Cullen Bryant and all of that coterie. Brought up in this intensely literary atmosphere, it was natural that she should write for the papers and magazines of her girlhood day. Her first poem appeared when she was not yet 17 years old. In 1843, she went to Boston and married Samuel Gridley Howe, a literary man. Mrs. Howe first became interested in the anti-slavery movement, which was started before she married. Then she took up prison reform, woman's suffrage, world peace, and has lent her brain to nearly every movement for the good of the American people. She has not only written many books, but she has lectured over the entire country. Her "Battle Hymn of the Republic" is known all through the land. She is still wonderfully active mentally for a woman of 90 years, and her memory of the past is astonishing. ### MAKING A MARTYR OF EMMA GOLDMAN

New York, May 26.—The activity of the police in watching Emma Goldman recently has resulted in the city council of East Orange, N. J., refusing her permission to speak there. She had already engaged the hall to make an address on June 8, but last night the council returned her money and informed her that she could not speak in that city.

In New York a police officer is constantly on guard at her apartments to inspect her callers and if possible, intercept messages and before she speaks publicly at any time she is warned by policemen and men from the district attorney's office.

This close espionage has led many to believe that the authorities anticipate some unusual activity on the part of the anarchists.

### TO ENJOIN OREGON TREASURER.

Salem, Or., May 26.—Proceedings have been begun in the state circuit court of Marion county to enjoin the state treasurer of Oregon from paying out \$100,000 appropriated by the last legislature to be used partly to defray the cost of constructing a wagon road from Bedford to Crater Lake, on the ground that it was special legislation. The road in question was the idea of E. H. Harriman, who proposed if Klammath and Jackson counties would contribute \$50,000 and the state appropriate \$100,000 more, he would add \$50,000 to make up the necessary \$250,000, which it is estimated the road will

cost. The course of the projected road runs from Medford to Pelican Bay lodge, Harriman's summer home in this state, and thence north to Crater Lake. This body of water is one of nature's wonders, but its inaccessibility prohibits its visiting it.

## A SUICIDE AND A WOULD-BE SUICIDE

New York, May 26.—At the same moment that a young man hurled himself from the Riverside drive viaduct over the intersection of One-hundred and twenty-ninth and Manhattan streets, before daylight today, a young woman attempted to leap from the Recreation pier a block away from the viaduct, into the North river. The man, whose identity has not been established, was instantly killed by the plunge of more than 100 feet to the street pavement. The young woman, who was caught be-

fore she could leap and who described herself as Grace Anthony, 22 years old, of Brooklyn, insisted that she did not know the suicide and that she act had no connection with hers.

In a pocket of the suicide was found a note addressed to "Dearest Lily," declaring his love for her, his inability to live without her, and his intention to kill himself.

"In the great hereafter social position will not keep us apart," he wrote, "we will all be equal then." The note was signed, "John."

Grace Anthony said she had sought death because she was alone in the world and without money. The fact that she was well dressed leads the police to believe there is some mystery attached to her identity.
