

ANOTHER HEAVY STORM HITS TOWN

Lightning Wreaks Havoc With
Light and Street Car
Service.

LOSS AT BINGHAM JUNCTION

Streets Become as Lakes and Quagmires—Hail at Salt Lake—Theaters Performances Interrupted.

There was another lightning, thunder and rainstorm last night, which came up and lasted until nearly 11 o'clock. The clouds seemed to gather from the entire west, and gradually covered the sky over the valley, as the moon made a series of spectacular attempts to shine through the fast approaching clouds. The lightning and thunder were incessant, the display of the electric fluid over the firmament being something unusually brilliant, with the jagged forks flying in all directions.

DAMAGES BY LIGHTNING.

The lightning struck the feed wires of the telephone power company north of Bountiful, putting that line out of commission. It burned out all the telephones in the Ogden country, and burned out a transformer at Bingham Junction, causing a loss there of \$2,500. Several other places to the south along the power lines were struck, but no serious damage done. The accident to the telephone plant cut off the street car service in this city for an hour and a half, as the rains descended and the floods came.

LAKES AND QUAGMIRES.

The usual amount of gravel and mud was washed down from the benches on the paved streets, while the torrents that poured into the east First South street excavations speedily converted that locality into a lake. The water, as large as birds' eggs, pelted so heavily on women's hats that the latter were thrown into consternation, as they hurried to shelter. The performances at the theaters were rudely interrupted, but the audiences took the situation good naturedly, and made the most of the situation.

The precipitation as registered at the weather bureau was .35 of an inch, but the fall was greater, around the outskirts of the city. The mercury did not rise above 84 degrees yesterday.

STORM QUITE GENERAL.

Low barometric pressure extends over the plateau and from the west Gulf northeast to the lake region. Over the Atlantic and north Pacific states, east barometric pressure is high. Showers or thunderstorms are reported over portions of Utah, Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Missouri, North Dakota, Minnesota, Illinois, Pennsylvania, New York, Massachusetts and Vermont. Heavy and excessive rains are reported as follows: Chicago, 3.50 inches, and Scranton, Pa., 1.40 inches. The temperature changes are generally unimportant.

J. J. McLELLAN SELECTED.

Appointed Conductor Salt Lake Symphony Orchestra vice A. Shepherd.

The long uncertainty that has attended the choice of a conductor for the Salt Lake Symphony orchestra, to succeed Arthur Shepherd, was cleared up yesterday afternoon, in the choice by the directors of Prof. J. J. McClellan as conductor, to serve during the indefinite term of absence of Mr. Shepherd. There were altogether some eight candidates for the position, and each candidate had his friends who worked earnestly for him, but the choice of the directors, unanimously settled on Prof. McClellan, who was notified later in a very cordial and complimentary letter. The new conductor has been studying for some time all active participation in the matter, preferring to be considered on his merits by the directors of the orchestra, and discouraged special eagerness on the part of his friends. All the comment he has made was a hope that he would be regarded as the man for the position, and would appreciate the honor which has now come to him. Prof. McClellan will take hold of the work as early as possible, and exert his best endeavors to raise the organization to a higher standard than ever.

PRISONER ALMOST SCALPED.

Member of Chain Gang Receives Heavy Blow on His Head.

A serious accident and one which almost resulted fatally, occurred on the chain gang this morning about 11:20 o'clock, when Amber Stark, aged 15 years, a prisoner serving 75 days, was struck on the head with a heavy pick in the hands of W. H. King, a 15-day prisoner. It was purely accidental and the fault of the injured youth.

The gang, in charge of Officers Harris and Tinges, was working on the road near the four mile north of the Warm Springs. Young Stark was using a crow bar while King was using a new, heavy pick. King struck a blow and as the pick descended Stark leaned over quickly and received the force of the blow on the head. The pick struck Stark on the back of the head and the point force across the scalp and slightly imbedded itself in the front of the head. The young man was almost scalped. He sank to the ground unconscious. The officers hurried to the prisoner's side and rendered what assistance they could. The patrol wagon was called and Sgt. Roberts and Officer Moore hurried to the scene as rapidly as possible.

In the meantime, Dr. M. R. Stewart was summoned and he met the wagon carrying the unconscious man back to the city. Dr. Stewart at once ordered the youth sent to St. Mark's hospital. Upon an examination being made it was found that the wound was not a fatal one. It required several stitches to close it up, but it is believed the young man will be all right in a few days.

On July 30, King was sentenced to 15 days for drunkenness and battery on the Salt Palace. On July 23 young Stark was convicted of petit larceny and sentenced to 75 days on the chain gang.

This afternoon Dr. Stewart sent word to police headquarters that the officers could take Stark from the hospital back to the jail.

NO TRUTH IN STORY.

Last evening Sergeant Johnson and Officer Curran arrested three Commercial street women named Laura Smith, Ray Woods and Evelyn Black on the charge of robbery. It was claimed that the Smith woman robbed a railroad man, whose name the police did not learn, of \$320 last Sunday night. The man told a rather improbable story and the police referred to the county attorney. After that official looked into the case he declined to issue a complaint.

BABEL OF TONGUES IN POLICE COURT

Several Varieties of Foreigners
Plead in as Many Different Languages.

DEFENDANT AS INTERPRETER

Drunks, Vagrants, Thieves and Burglars Go to Make Up Judge Diehl's Dainty Menagerie.

Judge C. B. Diehl of the criminal division of the city court had a session this morning that was enough to try the patience of Job. He had before him Germans, Austrians, Greeks and a man who was said to be an Austrian-Greek, but who indignantly denied the allegation. Then there were drunks, vags, petit larceny thieves and burglars to dispose of. The foreigners could not understand English and could not make themselves understood. In one case the complaining witness acted as interpreter and in another case a co-defendant acted as interpreter. Then Judge Diehl took a hand and after much sighing and facial contortions the docket was finally straightened out.

Joe Miller and J. W. Vuklich, were arranged on the charge of fighting. One is a Greek Catholic and the other a Roman Catholic. Vuklich claimed that Miller hit him with a rock and then fled. Miller, who is a Greek, stated in this morning that Miller is an Austrian-Greek and the latter hotly resented it. "No, no," he yelled, "Austrian, Greek-Austrian." That's all he could say. When asked to plead guilty or not guilty he could not understand and Vuklich was called upon to act as interpreter. The final verdict was not understood. Judge Diehl was unable to make heads or tails out of the case because Vuklich pleaded guilty so he decided to postpone the case until tomorrow morning at which time there will be probably half a dozen men there who can talk Greek, Austrian, and any old language.

COULD NOT UNDERSTAND.

The next case to worry the court and counsel was that of the city vs. P. Shrovin, a German who could talk but little English. He was charged with stealing some meat, bread and butter from Charles Seyboldt, a baker. Shrovin could not understand and could not talk except to admit that he did take the butter but not the meat and bread. He took about half the loaf of bread, product and then claimed that the cook gave it to him. Mr. Seyboldt, the complainant, was called upon to talk to the defendant and then Judge Diehl who talks German fluently, took a hand in the case and learned from the accused that he stole the butter. Then the price of butter went soaring. Twenty dollars a pound, Shrovin was fined \$10 and it is likely that for some time he will refrain from the luxury of butter.

W. C. Chambers and George Webb, two alleged strike breakers, were arraigned on the charge of battery. It is alleged that a few nights ago they got into a quarrel with a man near the Rio Grande depot and beat him. Chambers pleaded guilty and was fined \$10 while Webb, pleaded not guilty and was discharged.

John Sullivan, a healthy and husky, but decidedly lazy individual, unthinkingly came to court this morning by begging on the streets for 30 days. He will have a prominent place on the city chain gang. John Collins, an old drunk, was arraigned before Judge Diehl on the charge of being drunk. He was given five days for drunkenness.

HELD FOR BURGLARY.

Bert Woods and John Martin, the two young men arrested a few days ago for breaking into Levy's store on State street, pleaded guilty to the charge of burglary in the second degree and were ordered held in jail until the action of the district court is taken. The case was set for hearing Aug. 25.

MAY GO TO STATE PRISON.

Forest Wilson and Oswald Ferris Brought Before Judge Armstrong.

Forest Wilson and Oswald Ferris, two boys who were inmates of the state industrial school but who could not be controlled by the officials of that institution, were brought before Judge Armstrong in the district court today with a view of having them sent to the state prison. Stephen L. Richards, who is now in jail, was appointed to defend him, and the name was added to counsel by Judge Armstrong.

Wilson and Ferris made exceedingly bad records at the industrial school. Wilson made his escape at the time that St. R. Bayless, a prisoner, escaped. Wilson and Ferris were arrested a few weeks ago. Rasmussen and Buchanan escaped again after being captured, and Wilson also was caught, and another outbreak, but did not have the opportunity to carry it out. Wilson is the son of a traveling salesman for a Kansas city wholesale house, and the father of Ferris is a physician in Omaha. Both were sent to the industrial school for burglary.

GET PENITENTIARY TERMS.
