

**The Consul-General at London
Wanted at Washington.**

New York, Feb. 8.—A gentleman of more than local prominence who has long been identified with public affairs and reputed to be thoroughly informed regarding the last war, and who has just returned from a visit to Washington, said today, "Tuesday afternoon, President Harrison called General and Mrs. New, and asked them to come to Washington as soon as possible." It will be remembered that when Mr. New was making up his mind, New was anxious to see the Secretary of State, and his friends urged upon him that he could not then afford to sacrifice the encouragement of the Secretary of Treasury. The consequence is, that New will certainly go to Washington, probably as early as Saturday, to get many legitimate explanations for increasing that sum.

General New declares that the hand-some increase in the Division from year to year is better than the relationship with the perplexities involved in the impulse of ambition; he will naturally be the next Secretary of the Treasury. He is settled upon those who are best informed as to the President's purpose.

It is known that New has studied the subject thoroughly from a national standpoint, and is a man of great discretion and caution, besides thoroughly American in his views. His views fully support the views of Mr. Dixie. He is known to be most anxious to command the best, fullest and most accurate source of information. This fact alone makes New the strongest possible candidate for Secretary of the Treasury.

**Congress Disposed to go to Work in
Excess.**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—The two branches of Congress manifested yesterday a general disposition to do even more work daily hereafter. In the Senate, the Naval Appropriation bill was passed, and the House, after final action is reached on the Eight-Hour Bill, and the District of Columbia and Diplomatic and Consular Appropriation bills received their second readings, the two other bills which will probably intervene are the Copyright Bill, the Indian Depredations Bill and the National Canal Bill.

In addition to the measures which an effort will be made to attach a five dollar cottage rider to one of the appropriation bills, in which case some delay may result.

The legislation bills will probably continue to about nearly all the time of the House for some days to come, and the prospect for any general legislation is dim. The Senate will not sit. The silver bill and the report of the House investigating committee are subjects which may be precipitated upon the House during the week, but in what form it is impossible to predict.

Admiral Patti Arrested.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—The Berlin correspondent of the *Herold* says the police were sent to arrest Admiral Patti in M-dame Patti in behalf of the St. Petersburg authorities for breach of contract in refusing to sing unless her advance money was deposited with her banker, and that she was held in a sensational scene. Madame Patti was compelled to deposit the sum of \$2000 in order to obtain her liberty.

A Secret Alliance Against Salvador.

MEXICO, Feb. 8.—It is reported here that a secret alliance has been signed between Guatemala and Honduras against Salvador. A Guatemalan delegation, headed by Captain Bandala, today presented themselves from shot wounds inflicted by soldiers. General Sanchez was arrested several days ago for insubordination. Yesterday he was released, being held as a political suspect. The soldiers returned the fire, fatally wounding him. The Government has ordered a court of inquiry into the case.

Honduras is preparing for war, and bringing the army to the standard required by law.

PANAMA, Feb. 8.—A member of the late Houston, Tex., legislature, now in this city, has obtained evidence from a man here establishing the identity of the body found in Montana. He was previously acquainted with Robert E. Houston, and believes that the body is that of the Houston, as he is sure the body was that of the unfortunate gentleman.

The New Justice Premier.

Buenos Aires, Feb. 8.—The Hanes, representative of the *Surveiller Financier*, had an interview with Mariano Diaz, the new Italian minister. In this interview the conservative Captain Diaz declared that he had no objection to the formation of a coalition government, and expressed confidence that he would receive the support of the whole chamber. He said that he was no friend of the administration, but intended to support it, as far as the search to both useless and objectless. He predicted an abolition of the system of voting known as "several de leyes." A member of parliament, he said, was not contemplated by the new ministry.

Focusing upon foreign affairs, he declared himself a warm friend of the Dreyfus. In regard to domestic policy of the ministry, he said that reforming measures were proposed in every department of the government.

HONG KONG, Feb. 8.—The following cable will officially announced tomorrow, with the probable addition of Villiers as minister of education; Mariano Diaz as minister of interior; minister of foreign affairs and foreign minister of marine; Simon Colombe, minister of finance; Pedro Saenz, interior; Luis Gutiérrez, treasury; Pedro, war; Bernardo Vazquez, agriculture; and minister of foreign legations; Ernesto, justice.
