MISS ANTHONY IS GROSSLY INSULTED

San Francisco Post Gives Attention
to "No Gentleman."

DECRIES HIS BASE ATTACK

Upon Miss Susan B. Anthony Because
she Discourages the Rob-
erts Crusade.

The Evening Post of San Francisco, in its issue of December 14th, unmercifully castigates the Chronicle and a writer therein who directed his spleen against Miss Susan B. Anthony. The Post says:

"The Chronicle of this city printed a cowardly paragraph recently in which 'only one Gentleman' has been named to offer a word in defense of 'Mormon Roberts,' named the woman as Susan B. Anthony, and then sneeringly asked, 'Has Miss Anthony aspirations for a fourth place in the polygamist's affections?'"

It is hard to believe that a man wrote this indecent. Certainly no gentleman would have written it. It is unthinkable that any of the women employed by the Chronicle would so far forget the respect due one who has devoted a long life to noble effort on behalf of women compelled to work for a livelihood. It was not a gentleman who wrote this obscene insult at Miss Anthony, and no woman could have done it. The conclusion that the paragraph was written by a sexless hybrid or an irresponsible fool is inevitable. The circumstance that the Chronicle permitted it to appear in its editorial columns is wholly aside from the question of its decency or propriety. The Chronicle has printed similar insults to pure womanhood, and will probably continue to print them as long as the owner of that paper can hire writers mentally and morally as degenerate as the perpetrator who wrote this cruel and unjust slur against the womanhood of Susan B. Anthony.

The animus of the paragraph quoted from the editorial columns of the Chronicle lies in the belief of that newspaper that Polygamist Roberts is unworthy of his seat in Congress upon presentation of the charge that he is immoral and that his election to Congress was "an attack upon the sanctity of the home." Miss Anthony asserted that if this view of the unfitness of Roberts would prevail others besides the representative of the sovereign State of Utah would be deprived of the right to sit with the lawmakers of the nation. She advised that if a standard of moral fitness was to be established we might purge our content of the clearest of our legislatures of one who, while professing the utmost horror of such open and honest polygamy as that practiced by Roberts of Utah, wallowed in the filth of a polygamy a thousand times more menacing to "the sanctity of the home" than is the result of polygamous relations in the harem of this prince of the house of Judah, is the genealogical precursor of the founder of Christianity itself.

Brigham Roberts, Representative of the State of Utah, will not be expelled from Congress to which he has been legally elected because he is a polygamist or because he has "menaced the sanctity of the home," or because his name is associated with Breckinridge. If it is finally decided that the representative of Utah is not entitled to the seat to which he was elected it will be on grounds that conform to the requirements of the Constitution of the United States. As a correspondent of "The Post" has shown in a recent communication Congress cannot invalidate a lawful marriage, whether it be plural or single, or pass an ex-post facto law. It should be decided that a literal and unimpeachable interpretation shall be placed upon the clause of the Constitution providing that each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of two-thirds expel a member, a very dangerous precedent will be established. Whenever any party shall dominate the House or Senate by a two-thirds majority they may, upon the most trifling and flimsy excuse, compel the adverse minority.

Of course, in an effort to expel a political minority for political purposes, it would be argued by the minority that the power of the majority only included jurisdiction over violations of the rules of the House, and disorderly behavior of the members, but in the case of Roberts it has already been contended that this jurisdiction extends to an examination of the moral turpitude and the domestic relations of any member and especially to the private and domestic relations of Brigham H. Roberts, Representative of the sovereign State of Utah. This interpretation comes dangerously near to the denigration of States with those of the Church, and Americans will pause long before they will countenance any such interpretation as that.

There are other considerations in this question besides the mere right of a polygamist to occupy a seat in Congress, and it may be well to discuss them on a higher plane than that reached by the fool who wrote that insulting paragraph in the Chronicle.

MAY HAVE A "SENATRIX."

It has been suggested that, if the House of Representatives deprives Roberts of his seat, Utah will have an opportunity to vindicate polygamy by electing to the United States Senate Mrs. Mattie Hughes Cannon, says the New York Herald. This distinguished lady has already been a State Senator and should one say Senatrix?—and has acquitted herself with no small credit in a legislative capacity. As is well known, she holds steadfastly by the early tenets of the Latter-day Saints.

SALT LAKE BUYS LAMBS.

Bought Them in Canada and is Taking
Them to Nebraska.

"F. L. Oswald of Salt Lake City, one of the heaviest owners and breeders of sheep in the West, was at the yards en route home from Ontario, Canada, with three carloads of buck lambs which he is taking at present to his feed lots at Wood River, Neb., says the Omaha Stock Drivers' Journal. He purchased these lambs from Messrs. Gibson & Walker of Ilderton, Ontario, the leading Canadian breeders of sheep. They are of the celebrated Lincolnshire breed and are exceptionally strong, fine animals. He secured in his purchase 150 head of Lincolnshire buck lambs, averaging 142 pounds per head, the lightest weighing 116 pounds and the heaviest 173 pounds. Mr. Oswald will keep these lambs at his feed lots at Wood River, where he will be pleased to show them to any one desirous of visiting his ranch. The coming spring he will ship them to his range in Idaho where they will be put to service with his great flocks. Mr. Oswald says he has the finest lot of buck lambs ever shipped out of Canada, and expects great results to accrue from their superior breeding qualities, and in the near future will have the best and largest well-bred flocks to be found in the Western country."

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INVITES INVESTIGATION.

Gen. Merriam Expresses Pleasure at
Proposition of Congressman.

The proposed investigation into the Wardner mining riots, by Congress, meets with the unqualified approval of General H. C. Merriam, commanding this department, and who is and has been the target for all manner of attacks from labor unions over the country, says the Denver News.

"You can say for me," said the general yesterday to a News man, "that the more Congress investigates the Cour d'Alene troubles the better it will please me. I am pleased to know that such a movement is on foot."

"The Constitution speaks for itself," continued General Merriam. "Martial law was proclaimed by Governor Steunenberg May 3 last. Three days after I was ordered to the scene. Arrests were made by the State authorities—but I do not care to discuss the question. The records speak for themselves."

General Merriam has a mass of correspondence, papers, telegrams and clippings relating to the Wardner riots. Among this matter is a copy of the Idaho State Tribune of May 3, the official paper of the Western Federation of Miners, in which the official account of the troubles from the union standpoint, is published.

One of the most important documents received thus far by the general was in his mail yesterday.

Not Believe in Crusade.

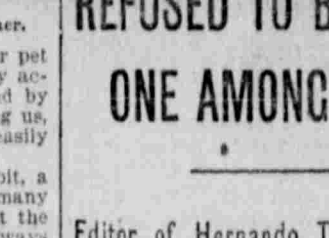
SAYS UTAH IS ALL RIGHT

Scandal Mongers Should Train Their
Batteries Upon Their Own
Transgressors.

The editor of the Times Promoter, published at Hernandez, Mississippi, having been requested to sign one of the petitions circulated throughout the country, for signatures from Sunday school children and other persons equally qualified to pass on the subject of excluding from his seat a member of Congress, made the following reply in his paper:

"I positively refuse to be a party to such silliness, unfairness, illegality and persecution. Mr. Roberts has spent his life in Utah; prior to the passage of the Edmunds act he had married three ladies who also were believers in polygamy; since the passage of this act which did not annul but prohibited polygamous marriages he has publicly lived with and cared for these wives; his life was an open book, and yet his people elected him to represent them in Congress.

recording as a brilliant piece of work, there are no further advices from the seat of war.

The Boers fear the British bayonets. This is illustrated in the full accounts now arriving of previous sorties. It seems that in Sir Archibald Hunter's raid on Ladysmith to capture the Boer guns, the British did not carry bayonets. While they were storming the Boers, suddenly aroused from sleep, rushed to the edge and opened an indiscriminate fire upon them. But just before the British secured a footing on the top of the hill some one among them shouted "Fix bayonets and give them cold steel." At this the Boers turned and fled into the darkness.

Little mention is made in the war office dispatches of horses, but it is understood that the losses in this respect have been exceedingly heavy. Among the officers alone from 20 to 30 per cent of their mounts have been shot from under them. The Boer tactics being to shoot first at an officer's horse and then the rider when dismounted.

The Times, while praising Col. Metcalf's brilliant feat at Ladysmith, expresses the opinion that relief being so nearly such a sorry waste rather perilous, and it would be better for Gen. White to avoid them so far as possible.

New York, Dec. 13.—A special to the Herald from Poughkeepsie, says:

Proof that at least one American soldier is fighting in the Boer army comes the story of Duncan N. Hood, a graduate of West Point, who has cast his fortunes with the South African republic. Direct information of his presence in the field has been received here. Young Hood is a son of the famous General Hood, of the Confederate army. He attended Riverview Military Academy, where he was prepared for West Point.

New Guatemalan Revolution.

New York, Dec. 14.—Guatemalan advices to the Herald are that the government's bulletin, just published, gives details of a revolutionary attempt in the eastern departments of Guatemala. Troops are now pursuing the revolutionists over the frontier into Salvador and Honduras.

The government has received from the bank a loan of a half million dollars to meet the expenses of the expedition. Several prominent citizens, supposed to be sympathizing with the revolutionary movement, have been taken prisoners.

Word comes from Colon that the Venezuelan consul there has received official notice of the blockade of the port of Maracaibo, recently captured by the revolutionists under Hernandez. No vessels can enter or leave the port until further orders.

Goes Out in Disgrace.

Berlin, Dec. 14.—The Klein Journal announces the impending resignation of Herr Von Miquel.

It declares that the minister of finance, in a moment of arrogance, dug his own grave. His recent declaration made him impossible.

"Herr Von Miquel," it says, "is no longer the Kaiser's man. He has played a double game on the canal bill and this is proved by the press intrigues of Herr Von Zedlitz. He has not only lost the confidence of the crown and of the people, but no one will trust him across the street."

The Germania reproduces the article and adds:

"This view is not only held by the court, but also gains extensive credence in political circles. Events of the immediate future will prove if it has any real foundation."

In the sitting of the Reichstag Count Von Buelow declared that the Samoan treaty contained no secret clause of a political or commercial nature, or any obligations toward England or America.

Discussing the Whipping Post.

Chicago, Dec. 14.—Chiefs of police are not all agreed that the whipping post would be a good thing, even for footpads.

The Tribune has interviewed police officials in a number of cities and has secured their views. The opinion was expressed recently that the introduction of the lash would be a good thing as a deterrent of footpads.

John Hayes, the chief of police of Kansas City, said he believed a vigorous lashing would cause footpads to try to get out of the range of cities where that practice was in vogue.

John J. Donahue, chief of police in Omaha, not only advocated the whipping post for footpads, but for other classes of criminals as well.

Chief of Police Quigley of Indianapolis says the footpad is a murderer at heart and therefore should be given unusual punishment. He would have them whipped and then sent to the penitentiary and afterwards whipped again.

Chief of Police Doyle, of Minneapolis, Chief of Police Watts of Boston and Chief of Police Bull of Buffalo do not incline to the idea of a whipping post.

Sortie was Brilliant, but Costly—
Boers Afraid of the Dayonet—
American with Boers.

London, Dec. 13.—The war office publishes the following dispatch from Gen. Buller: "Dispatch from Gen. White, dated December 11th, says:

"Last night Col. Metcalf and 500 of second rifle brigade sortied to capture a Boer howitzer on a hill. They reached the crest without being discovered, drove off the enemy, and then destroyed the howitzer with gun cotton."

"When returning, Metcalf found his retreat barred by the Boers, but he forced his way through, using the bayonet freely. The Boers losses were considerable."

"The British losses were as follows: Lieut. Ferguson and eleven men killed; Capt. Paley, Second Lieut. Davenport, Second Lieut. Bond and forty-one men wounded; six men captured, who had remained behind in charge of the wounded."

With the exception of Sunday's sortie at Ladysmith, detailed above, which the morning papers are unanimous in
