SAYS UTAHN IS ALL RIGHT

Scandal Mongers Should Train Their Ratteries Upon Their Own Transgressors.

The editor of The Times Promoter, published at Hernando, Mississippi, having been requested to sign one of the petitions circulated throughout the country, for signatures from Sunday school children and other persons equally qualified to pass on the subject of excluding from his seat a member of Congress, made the following reply in his paper: "I positively refuse to be a party to

such silliness, unfairness, illegality and persecution. Mr. Roberts has spent his life in Utah; prior to the passage of the Edmunds act he had married three ladies who also were belivers in polygamy; since the passage of this act which did not annul but prohibited polygamous marriages he has publicly lived with and cared for these wives; his ife was an open book, and yet his people elected him to represent them in ongress.

'Roberts is a professed 'Mormon.' His religion not only sanctions but com-mands plural marriages. He belives in it, as he has shown by his conduct.

may be believing in something that is not only uninspired but is also wrong socially and economically. But he be lieves it. That is sufficient. You may be your brother's keeper; but you are not his judge. He has a right to wor-ship his God according to the dictates of his conscience. In fact, I believe this determination to worship God according to individual conscience gave impetus to the opening and settling of this country. I further recollect that the framers of our Constitution considered this matter of worshipping God as any individual deemed fit of so much importance, that they incorporated in this memorable document a clause granting to every individual in this country the right to worship God according to his own conscience. "Much might be said against poly-

gamy from a social standpoint. Poly-gamy would cause much scolding and scrapping among the wives; and the average man has a pretty hard time providing for one wife. But if I re-member biblical history, those patri-archs and sages closest to God were not satisfied with monogamous marriage. Like Roberts they found more of happiness in the cares and loves of many wives. Abraham, Jacob, David and Solomon saw nothing wrong in taking

While they were storming the Boers, suddenly aroused from sleep, rushed to the edge and opened an in-discriminate fire upon them. But just before the British secured a footing on the top of the hill some one among them shouted "Fix bayonets and give them cold steel." At this the Boers turned and fled into the darkness,

Little mention is made in the war office dispatches of horses, but it is un-derstood that the losses in this respect have been exceedingly heavy. Among the officers alone from 20 to 30 per cent of their mounts have been shot from under them, the Boer tactics being to shoot first at an officer's horse and then the rider when dismounted.

The Times, while praising Col. Met-calf's brilliant feat at Ladysmith, ex-presses the opinion that relief being so near, such a sortie was rather perilous, and it would be better for Gen. White to avoid them so far as possible.
