

and through the primary ditch system with what is necessary for irrigation uses.

That the division of said water shall be equitable, as near as may be, among all the primary owners and as nearly as possible in the same proportion as originally apportioned to each under the primitive system.

That we will not oppose the exchange of our city creek irrigation water for a sufficient and satisfactory supply from another source, provided it shall be equivalent and permanent, but we will not surrender the one before we shall become possessed of the other, nor will we relinquish on any consideration whatever, our right to and use of a supply from City Creek for domestic uses.

That we pledge ourselves to the maintenance of our rights, as herein defined, and at any necessary cost; and that we invite all primary owners to City Creek water who reside in other districts, to participate.

And it is further resolved: That we appreciate in the utmost degree the proposed action of the city council regarding the extension of the water mains as recommended by their committees on waterworks and irrigation, and feel confident that their proposed means of irrigating by water from the fire hydrants will result in the saving of much vegetation that must otherwise suffer irreparable damage.

A petition was received from William Asper & Co. and others, asking the privilege of tapping the water mains leading to the Silver iron foundry. Referred.

Mr. Brown asked the privilege of connecting with a certain private service water pipe. Referred.

A petition was received from Frances C. Sanders, asking for the extension of the water mains along Apple Street from Currant Street. Referred to the committee on water works.

A petition was received from the Salt Lake Brewing Company asking permission to lay a private pipe from its property on the corner of Second South and Sixth East streets to its bottling works on the corner of Fifth South and Tenth East. Referred to the Mayor with authority to act.

A petition was received from Sarah Ann Daft, asking permission to pile building material in front of 126 East Temple Street, and also asking that the grade and line of said street be given to her. The former request was granted, and the city surveyor was instructed to establish the lines in question on payment of the proper fees.

The following communication was read:

The Honorable the Mayor and City Council of Salt Lake City.

Gentlemen:—The Utah Produce Exchange is an association of business men in the Territory of Utah, organized for the purpose of regulating prices, mutual protection among its members, and promoting the interests of the growers, dealers and shippers of Utah.

The Exchange would respectfully ask your honorable body to recognize the authority of the above committees in the discharge of the duties that may come before them for the coming year.

A communication was received from Alfred Solomon, John L. Nebeker and others, protesting against the council's granting a right of way to the Utah Western Railway along Fourth West Street.

Another petition headed by G. H. C. Gibbs with the same plea incorporated was read. Both were referred to the committee on streets with instructions to recommend the granting of no more franchises to paper corporations.

A gentle reminder was received from Parley P. Pratt, informing the Council that while it had voted him remuneration for the land taken from him to be used as a street, he had as yet been unable to find any one who was ready to carry out the decree of the Council.

The action of the Council adopting the report on the former petition was reconsidered. The report was referred back to the committee on streets for amendment.

The following signed by C. B. Tuckfield and others, was then read:

We, the undersigned, taxpayers and residents of the Eighth Bishop's Ward, First precinct, hereby petition your honorable body to grant unto us a supply of water through the hydrants, forthwith, which has been promised us through the district watermaster and which we have patiently waited for, and thus save our trees and vegetation from utter destruction, and your petitioners will ever pray.

Referred to watermaster and superintendent of waterworks.

Mrs. Julia Lipman, owner of the house No. 64 west, Fifth South Street, petitioned for the privilege of connecting sewer pipes from her house with the main running past said premises. Referred to the committee on sewerage.

A petition was received from the Western Union Telegraph Company asking the privilege of establishing a line of telegraph along Second Sixth Street west from the Denver & Rio Grande tracks to Main Street, thence north to a point in front of the said company's office. Referred to the committee on streets.

The chief of the fire department presented his quarterly report showing an expenditure of \$505.02.

The quarantine physician report-

ed additional expenses of \$441.40.

The following report was read and adopted:

To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council of Salt Lake City:

Gentlemen—Your joint committee to whom was referred the petition of the Salt Lake City Gas Company asking an extension of their charter for fifty years, on the same conditions as that of the Salt Lake Power, Light and Heating Company, beg leave to recommend that similar privileges be granted said gas company for a term of twenty years instead of fifty years as prayed for; and that the city attorney be instructed to prepare a suitable resolution in accordance with the prayer thereof.

Committee on streets and improvements.

SALT LAKE CITY, July 23, 1889.

The committee on Jordan and Salt Lake city canal reported on the petition of Julia Rockwood and others, for a bridge across the canal, recommending that the matter be referred to the city surveyor. Adopted.

The committee on police reported that the report of the city marshal for the quarter ending July 30 had been examined and found correct.

The committee on public grounds reported favorably on the petition of William Carroll, for the use of the west half of Washington Square, certain restrictions being stipulated. Adopted.

The same committee reported unfavorably on the petition of Orson Rogers, S. I. Clawson, D. A. Swan, hitherto referred to them. Adopted.

The committee on public grounds reported unfavorably on the petition of Walker Brothers Company and others, asking the exclusive right to sell refreshments in Liberty Park be granted to some individual, but recommended that such improvement as circumstances will permit be made in the park.

The same committee reported favoring the renting of the silk factory, from month to month, to the highest bidder.

The same committee reported adversely on the petition of Z. Wood asking to rent a certain portion of the city dumping ground.

The committee on irrigation reported favorably upon the petition of Angus M. Cannon, asking that arrangements be made for the draining of Roper Street.

The same committee reported on the petition of the Pratt Brothers Company, recommending that the same be referred to the water commission.

The same committee reported on the petition of Wilson, the lessee of the Deseret Factory grounds, recommending that the same be not granted.

The Council then adjourned for one week.
