The report is current on the streets that the mill at the Daly-Judge mine at Park City will close down shortly and will probably remain out of comat Park City will close down shortly and will probably remain out of com-mission until such improvements are made that will enable a better saving of the values. The plant up-to-date has been a sore disappointment to the management. The directors of the cor-poration discussed the matter of clos-ing several weeks ago and some of them were strongly in favor of it, but Superintendent Dunyon thought it might be well to give the plant a little further trial with the rebellious ores, so the subject was left in that shape. President John J. Daly announed at the time, however, that if the plant continued to make no better saving the only alternative left was to stop oper-ating it. It has been learned that while the mill has been turning out a great-er tonnage of concentrates lately, the fact still remains that a very large percentage of the values are being lost. It was stated, though, that no orders to close down had been promulgated, and probably none would be until the re-turn of Mr. Daly, who has been out of the city several days. Stockholders of the Consolidated Railway & Power Company Met This Morning.

UTAH LIGHT & RAILWAY CO. Will be the Name of the New Cor-

poration which Commences its Life Tomorrow Morning.

The stockholders of the Consolidated Railway and Power company met this morning, in Vice President Read's office in the Hooper building, the entire stock being represented. The meeting resulted in a unanimous approval of the proposition to merge with the Utah Light and Power company, and the merger goes into effect tomorrow, Jan. 1. The name of the new company will be the Utah Light and Railway company, and the capital stock of the consolidated concern is to be \$10,000,000, of which \$6,000,000 will be issued share for share in exchange for the stock of the old companies; \$4,000,000 only being preferred stock. It was voted at this morning's meeting to transfer all of the Today's Metal Quotations.

The directory will be composed to nine directory, three representing the Consolidated Railway and Power com-pany interest, three the Utah Light and Power company's interests, and three other investors. There was an adjournother investors. There was an adjourn-ed meeting yesterday afternoon, of the Utah Light and Power stockholders which confirmed and ratified the acts of the meetings held Dec. 15 and 16. Just when the new directory will meet and organize, cannot at present be stated; but it will meet at as early a day as possible, so as to get the new adminbut it will meet at as early a day as possible, so as to get the new admin-istration in working order without de-lay. The matter of general manage-ment, consolidation of offices, and redistribution of mechanical operations and the detailed operation of the consoli-dated concern, and the general policies to be observed in the conduct of the company will be then discussed and determined upon.

San Francisco, Dec. 31.—The Southern Pacific company has fitted up a car with all the modern improvements used in the handling and operating of rolling stock and will soon send it out on the divisions for the purpose of giving instruction to its employes in the new-est methods of railroading. The car will have instructors aboard. It is the plan of the company to have the car travel over the entire Pacific system, stopping at terminal points where men can be instructed in such work as is deemed necessary to make them more proficient.
