THE COMPROMISE ELECTORAL VOTE COUNT BILL.

THE passage of the compromis electoral vote count bill by bot

houses of Congress by heavy ma jorities is considered one of th most important acts of that honor able body for many years. Th

necessity for such a bill arose ou of the closeness of the present elec toral vote, the disputes concerning

alleged vital frauds in that vote in some of the States, and the dispute about the powers of the Presiden of the Senate in regard to counting the vote and accepting or rejecting the returns from some of the States.

If there had been an honest vot and an honest count in the severa States, this bill would have been altogether unnecessary. But the

law is made for transgressors, and because there were apparently s many transgressors both as regards voting and counting in the variou

States, hence the necessity for mor law in the matter, and further safe guards to the actual lawful ballo

for the candidates for the president tial chair. The bill provides for the refer ence of cases where there are two sets of returns from any State to a oint commission, composed of five members of each house of Congress and five judges of the Suprema
