### BODIES SOON BURNED TO ASHES

Seven People Perish in a Fire That Resulted From the Explosion of a Fuse.

#### NO WAY OF FIGHTING FLAMES.

In Mad Rush for Doors and Windows Many Persons Were Pushed Back late Building.

Avon. Conn., Sept. 15 .- The explosion of a fuse, followed by a fire, in a building of the Climax Fuse company here this afternoon caused a panic among 20 employes in the building and resulted in the death of seven and injuries that doubtless will prove fatal to several others. There was no way of coping with the flames, which soon spread and in less than an hour after the explosion those who were unable to escape were in the clutches of a fire that eventually burned their bodies to

It is the accepted theory here that in an effort to burn out a stoppage in one of the machines a workman caused an explosion of a fuse with the hot iron he held in his hand. Inflammable material was set on fire, and in a few moments the room was a mass of flemes. In an instant there was a mad rush for the doors and windows, and during the scramble many persons. during the scramble many persons were pushed back into the building, while others were severely burned.

As one of the walls of the second largest building fell several bodies could be seen entangled in the mass of machinery in the basement, and in a short time they were reduced to ashes. Early in the evening the body aghes. Early in the evening the body of a woman was seen near the edge of the fire, and an effort was made to pull it away from the flames, but on count of the great heat this was im-

which was blown up by a bolier explosion in San Diego harbor, will be tried before a naval court-martial ordered convened at San Francisco today:
Charge-Neglect of Duty,
Epecifications-Reciting, first that Commander Young failed to enforce paragraph 9, article 1605, United States navy regulations, which provides that all valves throughout the engineering department are to be moved at least once a week; second, that he failed to enforce paragraph 2, article 1609, providing that the safety valves will be partially lifted by the handgear at least partially lifted by the handgear at least once each week, when not under steam, to insure their good working order; third and fourth, that he failed to enforce other provisions of the regulations (article 652½), under which it was his duty to see that the safety and sentinel valves were kept in good condition and efficient working order: fifth, that he failed to comply with provisions of the regulations found in article 437 and article 670, requiring the commanding officer to approve the smooth log, and, sixth, that he failed to give such orders and percautionary instructions as were house is prorogued until Oct. 10."

The announcement was greeted by the members of the Left party with shouts of "The same old game."

#### TRIAL OF HUGH WATT.

x.M. P. Charged With Trying to Procure Murder of His Wife.

London, Sept. 15.—The Marlborough police court today resumed the trial of Hugh Wait, a former member of parli-Hugh Watt, a former member of parli-ament, on the charge of attempting to hire a private detective to assist him in murdering his former wife. The prosecuting counsel, Mr. Sims, present-ed two new witnesses who, he said, would swear that Watt incited them to murder the former's wife and her husband, Reginald Beauchamp.

The first of these witnesses, a man named Warley, who sells newspapers on the streets, told that he received various sums of money from Watt, who wanted him to kill the woman by chloroforming her or by using an other violent means, and who gave his instructions as to how to gain access to her apartments. The witness also swore that Watt incited him to kill Sir swore that Watt incited him to kill Sir Reginald Beauchamp, suggesting that he could run over him on a bicycle or follow him to Aigters, where he could get the "blacks to do the job."

The witness described various interviews he had with Watt. He said he finally became alarmed because he thought. Watt was going med and

"Industrial, commercial and agricultural progress continues satisfactorily. Nothing has occurred to weaken confidence, the disposition being to extend plans further into the future, and many plants have their facilities engaged well into next year. As demand broadens, there is a natural tendency to enlarge capacity, which adds to the dready exceptional structural ac-

"Thus far the wenther has not been cold enough to harm the crops that remain to be harvested, and another week of favorable conditions should assure an unprecedented yield of corn. Several settlements maintain labor dis-outes at the minimum, and mercantile

collections continue prompt.
"A few complaints of inadequate transporting facilities from manufactransporting facilities from manufac-turing centers are attributed to the re-quirements of grain moving. Railway earnings thus far reported for Septem-ber were 3.7 per cent larger than last year, while foreign commerce at this port for the last week showed gains of \$2,364,180 in values of exports and \$7,751 in inverse as compared with 97,851 in imports, as compared with

"The official report of exports of sta-ple products from all ports of the United States in August exhibited a gain of \$16.833.991 over the same month last year, or more than 5 per cent, "Large exports of packers' products, but on heavy Texas steers small con-cessions were made, although the limited offerings in other sections of the market maintained the average prices at the highest point.

"Failures this week numbered 194 in the United States, against 224 last year, and 29 in Canada, compared with 21 a year ago."
