> LEDI. PROVO SUGAR PLANT.

Now an Assured Thing-Will be a Duplicate of Bingham Station. Special Correspondence.

Lehi, Utah Co., Jan. 29.—The erection of a beet cutting plant near Provo, which has been under contemplation for some time past, is now a sure thing. The plant will be located twenty-five hundred feet south of the Oregon Short Line railroad track, about one-half mile north of the Prove river bridge, and at a point where there are four wagon north of the Provo river bridge, and at a point where there are four wagon roads in various directions leading, making it an ideal place for the delivering of beets by wagon. Work will commence at once preparatory to the building of this auxiliary plant, getting the grounds in shape, bids on machinery, rights of way, etc. The plant will be similar to the Bingham Junction pumping station in construction, and pumping station in construction, and the juice will be pumped to the central factory through the Utah Sugar company's main pipe line already running from Springville to Lehi. By the erection of this plant all the Provo farmers and all the Lake View beet growers will be enabled to deliver their beets by wagon and thus receive \$4.75 per ton

DISTRICT COURT HEARING. Suit for Damages Before a Jury-Death of John E. Anderson.

Special Correspondence, Farmington, Davis Co., Jan. 29 .-- In Judge Rolapp's court, before a jury, at Farmington, the case of Frank Fitzgerald vs Oregon Short Line, is on trial The suit is one for damages caused by an alleged wrongful ejectment of the plaintiff from one of defendant com-

pany's trains. In May, 1897, the plaintiff, Frank Fitzgerald, who was at that time in the employ of the Pioneer Electric Power company as a lineman, entered the Oregon Short Line train at Salt Lake, to go to Layton in Davis county, where he was to enter upon his work. The conductor demanded plaintiff's fare, he having no ticket; the plaintiff did not and he was ejected from the train at Wood's Cross.

The suit is for \$20,000 damages. The jury is composed of Elias Adams, Jos. Rollins, Andrew Grant, Wm. I Layton, Thomas Howard, Thomas Harries, Wm. Blood and David K.

The first witness examined for the plaintiff was Mr. Fitzgerald, the plain-tiff, who testified as to his entry on the train without a ticket and as to tendering the conductor a sum of money which was refused as being insufficient. That he got off the train at Woods Cross, under the conductor's instructions; and that he tried to chase a ticket at that station but did not have time, and in attempting to get aboard the train again as it was leaving the station the conductor forcibly ejected him from the platform of one of the cars, resulting in his body being bruised and wounded. Dr. Hasbrouck testified as to treating him for his bod-

lly ailments thereafter. George Pearson testified to seeing the conductor eject the plaintiff from platform, and to seeing the latter fall
