

## HOUSE ANXIOUS FOR EVIDENCE

Special Committee Wants Resolution Adopted Asking President to Give Information

### REGARDING SECRET SERVICE

Members Recent Language Used by Him in Annual Message in Referring to Congressmen.

Washington, Dec. 17.—Chairman Perkins of the house special committee appointed to recommend a course of action relative to the suggestion of the president in his annual message concerning the secret service, to which members of Congress have taken exception, presented a report of that committee at the beginning of today's session of the house.

The report recommends the adoption of a resolution calling upon the president to supply the house with the evidence upon which he based his statement that the members of the house were principally concerned over the fact that the secret service men had been investigating members themselves.

The house adopted the Perkins resolution in regard to the president and the secret service without a dissenting vote and after very little comment. Mr. Cockran, New York, suggested that it should be made applicable to Congress as a whole and not merely to the house, but the charge was not made.

In the preamble to the resolution it is declared that the plain meaning of the president's words in "that the majority of the congressmen were in favor of being investigated by secret service men and that Congress as a whole was actuated by that motive in enacting the provision in question."

### PREAMBLE.

"Whereas, There was contained in the sundry civil bill which passed Congress at its last session and became a law, a provision in reference to the employment of the secret service of the treasury department; and

"Whereas, In the last annual message of the president of the United States to the two houses of Congress, it was stated with reference to that provision: 'It is not too much to say that this amendment has been of benefit only and could be of benefit only

to criminal classes," and it was further stated that the chief argument in favor of the provision was that the congressmen did not themselves wish to be investigated by secret service men, and it was further stated, "But if this is not considered desirable a special exception could be made in the law, prohibiting the use of the secret service force." In investigating members of Congress, it would be far better to do this than to do what actually was done and strive to prevent or at least to hamper effective action against criminals by the executive branch of the government; and

"Whereas, The plain meaning of the above words is that the majority of the congressmen were in fear of being investigated by secret service men, and that Congress as a whole was actuated by that motive in enacting the provision in question; and

"Whereas, Your committee appointed to consider these statements of the president and report to the house cannot find in the hearings before committees nor in the records of the house or senate any justification for this impairment of the honor and integrity of the Congress; and

"Whereas, Your committee would prefer, in order to make an intelligent and comprehensive report, just to the president as well as to the Congress, to have all the information which the president may have; therefore, be it

### THE RESOLUTION.

"Resolved, That the president be requested to transmit to the house any evidence upon which he based his statements that the 'chief argument in favor of the provision was that the congressmen did not themselves wish to be investigated by secret service men,' and also to transmit to the house any evidence connecting any member of the house of the Senate with corrupt action in his official capacity and to inform the house whether he has instituted proceedings for the punishment of any such individual by the courts or has reported any such alleged delinquencies to the house of representatives."

### RECOMMENDED UNANIMOUSLY.

In reporting the resolution Mr. Perkins said it had been recommended unanimously by the special committee, and said that as soon as the information should be in any information in his possession, the committee would make

another report for the consideration of the house.

Representative John Sharp Williams expressed the hope that the resolution would be adopted promptly and practically without debate.

Mr. Williams said the committee would impartially report upon "this seemingly unprovoked and unjustified attack upon the honesty and reputation of the legislative branch of the government."

"So far as the committee knows," said Mr. Williams, "there is not a scintilla of evidence to support that statement by the president. The committee has thought it would be fair to the president to give him further opportunity to produce testimony if he has any. The American people have a right to know if the American Congress be corrupt."

Such a procedure, he continued, would allow the country which he said, "was the master of both of us," to exercise judgment in the matter. The special committee, he said, would remain in session "ready to receive, to consider and to weigh whatsoever competent evidence the president can furnish with a resolute justice and impartiality."

Mr. Perkins said the committee was actuated by a desire to be entirely just to the president. Mr. Keifer of Ohio, wanted to know whether the words "if not incompatible with the public service" should not be in the resolution as usual in calling upon the president for information. This suggestion called forth laughter and Mr. Perkins declared that the resolution as worded was "a request for information," and was imperative in its wording.

Mr. Perkins cut off further discussion by demanding the previous question and Speaker Cannon calling for a viva voce vote there was a chorus of ayes, favoring the passage of the resolution followed by a dead silence when the "noes" were called for.

### INTERESTING TESTIMONY ON PULLMAN CAR TIPS

Chicago, Dec. 17.—The upper berth in a Pullman was further disparaged today, when two women took the witness stand before Interstate Commerce Commissioner Lane, who is considering a plea that an upper berth should cost only half of the price charged for a lower. The witness also affirmed that it is terrible to tip the porter, said tipping being necessary "to get any kind of service."

Mrs. Anna L. McNulty and Mrs. A. J. Vorwerk, whose business calls for constant traveling, were the witnesses. They would never take an upper berth unless compelled to do so by force of circumstances, both agreeing that there is a great deal of trouble in getting in and out of one, and that the ventilation is bad.

"In traveling in Pullman cars do you find it necessary to tip the porters?" asked Atty. Hamilton.

"It is if one expects to get any service at all," answered Mrs. McNulty. "How do you know?"

"On several occasions I did not have any change and when I failed to tip the porter I was obliged to carry my own luggage."

"How do you know about the service when you do not tip the porter until the end of the trip?"

"I have learned by experience that the porter is impatient and will not give you the service you are entitled to unless you tip him. On long trips I always give a tip at the beginning, as well as at the end of the trip."

Asked for a distinct illustration of discrimination against one who had neglected to tip the porter, Mrs. McNulty related the following:

"Last September, when I was coming from San Francisco, to Chicago, I stopped off in Denver and the porter helped me with my luggage. A lady with a small baby in the next section called several times for the porter, and I told him to leave my luggage and see what the woman wanted. He snuffed and said there was no money in it, and he paid no attention to her. I suppose she was unaccustomed to traveling and did not know how essential it is to tip the porter."

Commissioner Lane took the case, which specifically applies to rates between Chicago and St. Paul, under advisement, and left for Washington tonight.

Two other cases, involving the rates between Duluth and St. Paul, and St. Paul and Seattle, will be heard later.

### GOT CREDIT FOR \$200,000 ON ASSETS OF ONLY \$200

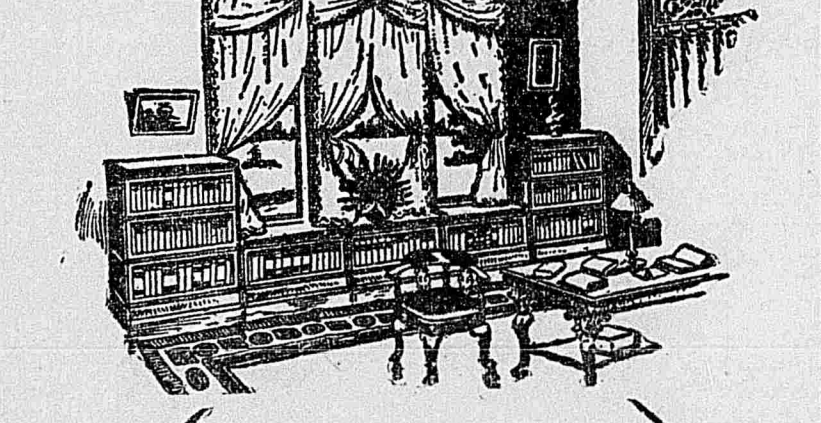
