President Hewett, in his speech of ac-ceptance, declared that, with the co-operation of the members of the as-sociation, an independent smelter will certainly be erected in the vicinity of this city in the near future. The re-port of the resolutions committee de-clared that "it has been demonstrated that the conditions affecting the reduc-tion of ore, on part of custom smelt-ers, are needlessly and unfairly re-strictive and apparently have for their ultimate purpose the absolute control of the production, treatment and mar-keting of the preclous metal produc-tion of the mines of America." The convention decided to take steps "to protect the mine operators of Mon-tana against the danger of ultimate control by the smelter trust." When the association was called to order today, Secretary Lindermann re-ported that up to last night 107 had paid the initiation fee of \$25, and af-ter the appointment of usual commit-tees a recess was taken until after-noon. Every district in Montana, parts of Idaho and other states are represented. Many more applications are expect-

The purpose of the meeting is to consider the advisability of erecting an independent smelter, it being professed that the treatment charges of the American Smelting & Refining com-pany are exorbitant and prohibitive. This afternoon resolutions were read and adopted, declaring that forest re-serve officials are not complying with the law through inhibiting operations thereon, and another resolution charg-es collusion and fraud in the classifi-cation of Northern Pacific land grants, it being charged that through underit being charged that through under-hand methods the common carrier has wrongfully secured possession of im-mense tracts of timber and mineral loads

lands. An amendment was offered appor-tioning \$500 to defray the expenses of a committee to go to Washington and iay the matter before the president and request that he send a special message to Congress on the subject. That an independent smelter will be built by the operators seems certain.

Valparaiso, Feb. 18.—The doings on the oast of Chili of the Japanese steam-er Kasato Maru in view of the prox-imity of the American battleship fleet, attracted considerable attention here. The Kasato Maru left Iqique on Jan. 23 and steamed out to sea. Nothing was heard from her until two days ago, when she arrived at Tocopilla, a small maritime town in Antagaata province, 140 miles distant from Iquique.
