The temperature fell 10 deg. to 22 deg. over portions of northern Utah, Idaho, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Oregon, and the British northwest territories, and rose 10 deg. to 12 deg. over portions of Missouri. Frost was reported over portions of Idaho, and Washington.
