

## DEED.

At Plain City, April 20 '72, of pneumonia, ALEXANDER MORRIS SHOEMAKER.

Born in Pendleton county, Kentucky, July 8, 1813. In 1835 he married Margaret Taylor, and shortly afterwards moved to the State of Illinois, where he heard the gospel, and was baptized into the church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints on the 15th of February, 1839. In 1841 he removed to Hancock County, and into the city of Nauvoo in the Autumn of 1844, where he remained till the exodus of the Saints in 1846. Stood firm with his brethren in all the trials when the lives of Joseph and Hyrum were sacrificed. Moved west with the church and spent the winter of 1846-7 on the banks of the Missouri river. Again moved westward in the company of Elder C. C. Rich, and arrived in Salt Lake Valley, Oct. 1, 1847. He assisted in surveying Salt Lake City, and remained a resident of Utah and a faithful member of the church ever since. At the time of his death he was one of the directors of the local Co-operative Mercantile Institution and was one of the most prominent in making that institution successful. Faithful and true to his religion and to his brethren, a friend to the just of all mankind, upright and just in all his dealings, the veteran has passed away with the universal esteem of all who knew him. He leaves a devoted wife, the companion of his early youth and a number of children and grandchildren. —Com.

## AUDITOR'S WARRANTS.

SEC. 3 Of an Act approved February 15, 1872, reads as follows:

"The Auditor of Public Accounts is hereby authorized and required to call in all outstanding Auditor's Warrants, on or before the first day of August, A. D. 1872, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, and to issue therefor warrants under his official seal. He shall publish a notice in one or more newspapers having general circulation in this Territory, stating that such warrants are required to be exchanged."

All persons holding Auditor's Warrants not having thereon the impress of the Auditor's official seal, will please forward them to this office immediately to be exchanged in pursuance of the above section. New warrants with official seal attached, will be issued promptly to replace those so forwarded, and returned to the owners by mail or otherwise at their risk. Tax collectors of the several counties are authorized to receive Auditor's warrants on taxes due the Territory until the 1st of August next, although said warrants may not have the official seal attached, but it is expected they will forward them to the Territorial Treasurer with as little delay as possible. Persons holding Auditor's Warrants, not having the Auditor's official seal attached, after the 1st of August, 1872, will do so at their own risk.
