At a meeting of Unionists today the premier urged his supporters to be regular in their attendance at the house of commons so as to prevent the defeat of the government as the result of a snap division. HOLDUP IN ALASKA.

Appeal for Troops Made to War Department.

Seattle, July 17.—Alarmed for the safety of millions of dollars worth of gold dust in and about Fairbanks, Alaska, as the result of almost daily hold-ups of natives by armed men,

The secretary of War and the Washington congressional representatives have been asked to see about getting the Alaska Guard sent to the scene of the trouble. Albert White, secretary of the Miners and Prospectors' association has telegraphed to the War Dept. The necessity for troops is imperative. The commander of the department of the Columbia has been ordered to make an investigation. Alaska men who have been in the Yukon have heard the banks tell thrilling stories of lawlessness in that camp. The lawless element from Nome, attracted by the amount of gold in the Tanana are responsible for the trouble. The Tanana men are to accompany all gold trains. A fear is expressed that Fairbanks banks will not be attacked. Handits have already shot several men, dispatches
