BAY STATE DEMOCRATS NAME THEIR TICKET
Boston, Sept. 30.—With singular unanimity the Massachusetts Democratic party today in convention here named its state ticket and adopted a platform of party principles. Two men formerly enrolled in the Republican ranks were named on the ticket. These so-called "liberal" Republicans are Eugene N. Fox, for many years the foremost member of the "reciprocal wing" of the Republican party, and Harvey N. Shepherd.

For lieutenant-governor—Eugene N. Fox, Scituate.
For secretary of state—Prof. Arthur T. Clark, Williamstown.
For treasurer and receiver-general—James H. Bryan, Westfield.
For attorney-general—Harvey N. Shepherd, Boston.
For auditor—Alexis Boyer, Jr. of Southbridge.

DEMOCRATS NOMINATE GAYNOR FOR MAYOR

New York, Sept. 30.—The Democratic convention for the city of New York tonight nominated the following ticket:

For mayor—Justice William J. Gaynor of Brooklyn.

For comptroller—Albert M. Moore of Manhattan.

For president of the board of aldermen—John P. Galvin of Manhattan.

Justice Gaynor is 58 years old. He became nationally known nearly a score of years ago for his work in breaking up rings in the Democratic party and for his action in securing the conviction of John Y. McKane, known as the "Czar of Coney Island," for election frauds.

In national politics a consistent and life-long Democrat, Justice Gaynor was nominated for the supreme court by the Republicans and Independents of this city, and since that time has twice declined nomination for governor, offered him by his own party.

Justice Gaynor, in a statement tonight said:

"I have not asked for the nomination and it comes to me without even a suggestion of any pledge, understanding or coalition whatsoever. We have reached the end of an old and the beginning of a new era in the government of this great city, which should be an object lesson for good instead of a bad example to the cities of the nation."

"Unlawful and annoying interference, oppression, lawless force and violence, lawless arrests and imprisonment, dishonesty and corruption, are deemed in this city. It means a government of laws and not of men. It must not be turned into a government of men and not of laws. The vice of arbitrary power is a greater menace to a free government than all other vices combined."

NEW YORK POLICEMAN ASSAULTS FRENCH OFFICER

New York, Oct. 1.—Admiral Le Prieux in command of the French battleship attendant upon the Haskell-Pullin celebration has made public a statement that an ensign of the French navy has been assaulted by a policeman. It was explained that it was not the wish of the French officers to make an international matter out of the disturbance, or to cause any friction between the two governments by sending an official note to the mayor or other city or federal authority and that therefore it has been deemed best to merely allow the facts to become public. The young officer is said to have been trying to get to an elevated railroad station when he was stopped by a policeman on the crowded subway. Words followed and according to the statement given out by the policeman struck the young officer in the face, sending him sprawling upon the stairs. In his descent he knocked down several women.

GREAT LOVING CUP.
Presented by Officers and Men of Atlantic Fleet to Japanese Navy.

New York, Oct. 1.—The officers and men of the Atlantic fleet have subscribed to buy a loving cup to be presented to the Japanese navy, through the Maine destination at Washington in appreciation of the hospitality and

kindness shown to the American sailors on their visit to Japan last October. The names of the battleships whose crews have subscribed to the fund are:

Connecticut, Vermont, Kansas, Minnesota, Virginia, Missouri, Kearsarge, Alabama, Iowa, Rhode Island, New Jersey, Illinois, Wisconsin, Ohio, Maine and Nebraska.

The loving cup is a beautiful example of the goldsmith's craft, standing about 30 inches high on an onyx stand. It cost \$2,100. The United States coat of arms is engraved on the side of the cup and the Japanese emblem on the other. The inscription engraved underneath the American eagle reads:

"The officers and men of the United States Atlantic fleet in token of their sincere appreciation of the gracious and kindly courtesies shown them by the officers and men of the Imperial Japanese navy during the visit of the Atlantic fleet in October, 1908."

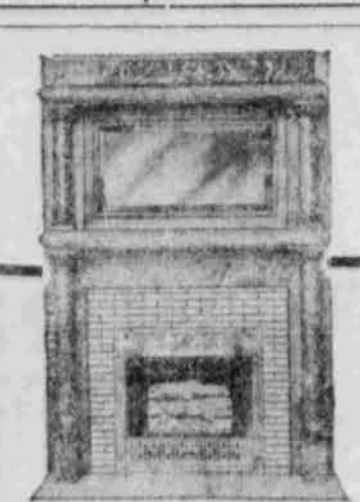
