He became nationally known nearly a score of years ago for his work in breaking up rings in the Democratic party and for his action in securing the conviction of John Y. McKane, known as the 'Czar of Coney Island,' for election frands. In national politics a consistent and life-long Democratic Justice Gaynor was nominated for the supreme court by the Republicane and Independents of this city, and since that time has twice declined nomination for gover-nor, offered him by his own party.
