TO BRIDGE BUILDERS.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that the Selectmen of Salt Lake County will on Saturday, the 7th day of March next, at 12 o'clock M., let (on the ground) to the lowest responsible bidder, the building of a bridge across the Jordan River, on the County Road, about half a mile south of Crismon's Mill.

Said bridge to be 200 feet long and 16 feet wide, to be built on piles, not less than one foot in diameter at the centre of the stick, and driven not less than not less than nine feet below the bottom of the channel, 35 in number, eleven caps 12 inches square put on said piles with mortice and tenon to go through said caps, fifty stringers 20 feet long, not less than one foot in diameter in the centre, Said bridge to be covered with good red pine plank, three inches thick, with good and substantial hand rails; all of the timber to be of red pine; the work to be done in a good and substantial workmanlike manner, and to be completed on or before the first day of September next.

The person or persons taking the contract for the building said bridge will be required to give bonds, with approved security, for the faithful performance of said contract.
