Sheepmen Decide to Give the Eastern Brokers One More Chance.

WILL INVITE COMPETITION.

That is the Very Latest Brought From Boise Today by Local Rails road Man.

Claude S. Williams, general agent for the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, came back from Boise this morning with the latest news on the Idaho wool situation. Mr. Williams states that when he jeft Boise the Woolgrowers had about decided that before they took the step of sending Mr. Fred Gooding east to arrange for storage and financing the sheepmen's merger that they would give the easter.: buyers another chance to take the 6,000, In this connection within a few days announcements will be forthcoming of wool sale days at different points in Boise territory. Different days will be set apart when it is anticipated that the buyers will congregate at a given place and put in bids for the various cups offered for sale.

Should there be no competition and low tenders offered the sheepmen then will go ahead with their proposition of shipping their baler east, storing them with a man in charge and selling them direct to the manufacturers as the demand for wool occurs.

## FISHERMEN TO GO ON THE WARPATH

Will Publish Report on All Violations of the Law They Can Locate.

COMMITTEE IS INSPECTING.

Lawyer Employed and Law Breakers Will be Brought Into Court to Explain Lack of Screens.

The next meeting of the Utah Fish and Game Protective association will probably be a stormy one. There was the makings of that kind of a meeting last night at the Commercial club, but it was decided to wait till known facts could be backed up by evidence to convict and then take out the battle axe and mix with those who are responsible for the loss of trout contrary to law and against the peace

The fourth large meeting of men determined to have better fishing and more of it is Utah developed the fact that a decided battle will be necessary this summer, and next spring to create conditions which will make the retain of old-line fishing possible. It was pointed out last night that every Utah fishing stream is almost a memory, so far as its trout are concerned, and that the percentage of these fish which have been caught with hook and line is almost nothing, compared with the destruction wrought by dams, unscreened ditches, dynamilting and snagging. #### WILL INVESTIGATE STREAMS.

A committee of men with fire in their eyes was named last night to scout up and down Parley's canyon stream, the Mountain Dell branch the two Cottonwood streams, Fish creek, East Canyon creek, Mill creek, the Provo river, and any other available streams, and to report the exact nature of any conditions found to exist contrary to the interest of the fish.

SOME EVILS.

SOME EVILS.

Prior to the forming of this committee reports were volunteered that a mining company is dumping its poisoned water from its slum pond in Little Cottonwood canyon into the creek, about twice a week, and with the milky white flow comes down a supply of murdered fish, that almost all irrigating ditches are unscreened, and thus let thousands of fish out onto lucern patches and farm lands, that power companies have failed to make runways over their dams, and have thus depopulated streams of their fish, and that irrigation companies have failed to screen the Intakes of their reservoirs. 'In fact, said one trate fisherman, 'we have a splendid fish law in this state that is almost a dead letter, Its enforcement rests with the fish and game commissioner, the county commissioners, and the deputy game wardens in each county. I am for using moral sussion first and if that fails a bunch of county commissioners sited to appear in court might do some good.

DEPUTY WARDENS. It was found that State Fish and Game Commissioner John Sharp had agreed to make all the members of the association deputy game wardens without pay. This gives them power to act when they find viciations of the law, and it was decided to accept the proposition, and apply for the appointments. "Then, explained one flishermap, "If you tell a farmer he aught to have a screen in his ditch, and he pokes you one in the jaw by way of reply you can have him fined about twice as much for resisting an officer as he would get for violating the fish law."
