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ANOTHER CLAIM ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

We publish today the petition of the trustees of the Brigham Young Academy of Provo, which has been filed in the Supreme Court of the Territory, asking for a portion of the property of the Church that is now in the hands of the trustee.

The claims of the Academy are clearly set forth and the facts presented are indisputable. If this property is to be distributed in a manner not designed by the original contributors, it looks through the B. Y. Academy at Provo, the B. Y. Academy at Logan and the B. Y. University to be established in this city, should come into the possession of a part of the funds. They were all intended by the late President Brigham Young as a means of securing advanced education to children of leaders of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. And his existence, in design or in fact, is evidence that the object of "Mormon" aspiration is schools—an invention of the enemy.

But the personal property of the Church was not donated for these institutions or either of them.

The contributions came to the Church in the form of offerings for Church purposes. The objection to the retention of the funds by the trustees of the Academy, or their passing from the defendant corporation to the living body, was that they might possibly be used for improper purposes, in the support or apportion of property. That objection having been fully removed, there is no reason in morality or justice, neither in law or logic, why the property should not be held in trust of the Church in general Church purposes, with legal restrictions preventing its use for any unauthorized purpose.

The amendment of a successor to Senator French now rests with Governor Thompson of Kansas. The Legislature of that State will not meet until two years from the present. Ingle is already talked of as the future Senator. If he should be appointed, a sturdy, energetic and vigorous anti-slavery man will succeed French. It would be interesting to see French and Ingle face to face in a debate in the Senate.

But if the court finally decide that it shall go where it really belongs, and would naturally report, then we see no good reason why those whom the Church funds have been deposited, should not each receive a fair proportion of the exchanged property, that children of the people who donated the money might receive its benefits.

However, this is a little late for the petition from Provo. We do not know whether the trial date is to receive attention from the Master in Chancery, who it is supposed has nearly if not quite completed his report. It is worthy of consideration and the claim is urged to a committee, yet comprehensive balance.

We hope that, whatever time it may take to reach a conclusion of this vexed question, Justice will be done at last, and that this government will not place the half培在 the history of the nineteenth century, as a despoiler of a religious organization because it was unchristian. In this age of religious toleration, such a proceeding would be an anachronism, as well as a direct departure from the spirit and tendencies of the past and from the genius of the institutions of the country.

THE BASIS OF THE EUROPEAN DIFFECTION.

Those only who have given more than cursory attention to the European situation are informed with regard to the cause of the present misunderstanding between leading nations of the continent. Russia, in combination with France, insists that all international obligations be squared upon the basis of treaties heretofore entered into by the great powers. The Drei邦, consisting of Germany, Austria and Italy, and to a certain extent England, take the ground that matters shall remain in statu quo. The Chancellor holds that if other powers thus disregard the obligation of treaties he is justified in doing the same and looking after his own interests. The British contention of Egypt is pointed at him as a breach of international agreements made to re-establish, in opinion of the French nation, in a way to discredit India and France bring about a right result.

England seems to give Russia an opportunity to interfere in that country, which occupies an important position geographically, as to enable her to do so.

The difficulty involved can be understood on this basis, as every movement must give out of it. As there is no prospect of the actions of either side relinquishing their respective positions on the main question, it looks as if an ultimate conflict is inevitable. The situation grows more and more critical.

DEATH OF SENATOR PLUM.

The despatches bring news of the sudden death of Senator French of Kansas, at his apartments in Washington, D. C. His death is ascribed to apoplexy, induced by overwork.

President B. French was born in De-

witt County, Ohio, October 12, 1813. He married in 1837. He was removed to the West in 1840, and was a member of the Legislature in 1842. In the latter year he was a member of the House of Representatives of the U. S. Congress, and was elected United States Senator from Kansas in 1857, and reelected in 1860. He died at his deathbed, on his third term, December 18, 1863, in Washington, D. C., at 108½ years of age.

He was a strong and able man both physically and mentally. He was a great champion of Western interests and individualism in committee work. He was for a long time on the committees of Agriculture and Appropriations, and was chairman of the Committee on Public Lands. He was thoroughly posted on public affairs and gave his opinions freely and intelligently. He was a man of much energy, any time during the past three years, but Queen Victoria sternly forbade his sending his grandsons to marry the German Emperor's youngest son, Margaret of Prussia, a clever but by no means handsome lady.

Princess Mary, mother of the present little, is the younger sister of the Duke of Cambridge, Commander-in-Chief of the British army. She married the Duke of Teck, in 1847, and has had three daughters and one son since. Her husband died in 1851, and she has been widowed ever since. She has been a widow for twenty years.

Princess Mary was a remarkable young person, very active in her youth. Besides her husband, were many and famous. Among these were Prince of Orange, heir to the throne of Holland; Prince Napoleon, son of Napoleon III; and Prince Edward. The Queen opposed all these, B. French, son of Senator French, was a clever boy, and his death caused a great deal of regret among his friends.

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"The death of Senator French, while regarded as a misfortune in royal and aristocratic circles, The Duke of Teck, father of the wife, is of aristocratic birth. He is son of Alexander of Wurttemberg and of his marriage with Hungarian Countess. But in England it is probable that this will not be so. The young lady is looked upon as a thoroughly English girl, and is popular with both the nobility and people. The match is regarded as a wise one, and the Teck family has been financially embarrassed for some time. This may induce Parliament to take a sentimental view of the matter, and make provision for young Alfred Vane.

WHEN THE TIDE REVIEW.
