THE GRAND JURY
Is held to be investigating the responsibilities of Ogden's City Council.

Of late there seems to be considerable uneasiness manifested by certain members of our city council. The occasion of their uneasiness lies in the fact that two or three gentlemen, who are more or less acquainted with the workings of the council, persist in trying to unravel little insinuations alleged to have been winked at by the said "corrupt" members of that body. As far there have been no specific charges made public yesterday the grand jury, it is said by one who thought to know, had a good round dinner with them last night, and the same pretty strong evidence was brought out in the investigation.

The Brown Will.
Some time since the will of the late John Brown was filed with Clerk Lawrence of the probate court, and July 27—yesterday—was set as the date for hearing the petition of the executor. In the meantime it has been discovered that Mr. Brown did not sign the will in the presence of the witnesses, Oscar Hill, Thomas Wilson and H. W. Cross, therefore it is not known whether the last will of the deceased will be admitted to probate. When the will was signed by Messrs. Hill and Wilson, the place where the signature of Mr. Brown was supposed to be, and while there is no doubt as to the genuineness of the signature, one very important matter was neglected, that of securing the testimony of the witnesses. As a result serious complications may ensue. The estate, which includes the Brown hotel and other real property in this city is valued from \$100,000 to \$125,000.

The retirement committee held a short session yesterday in the mayor's office to talk over the matter and determine upon a plan which will be acceptable to the council. To the Grand Jury.
The case of Louis A. Mauglioli was yesterday referred to the grand jury as it is now in session. Two witnesses were examined by Commissioner (Hickok) for the purpose of determining what to do with the girl in the case. It was decided to refer her to the fourth district court where she will be examined as to her fitness to become an inmate of the Reform school.
