

a loss of 500 trees, 17 years old. The estimated loss in the apple crop of this country alone will be 2,000,000 bushels. Small fruits are also damaged.

Quebec, 20.—The snow blockade prevents trains arriving since yesterday morning.

Richford, Vt., 20.—A snow plow came in collision with a train on the Southeastern. Several persons were badly injured. No train from Montreal since Sunday noon. The Boston express stuck here to-night.

Omaha, 20.—A heavy snow storm began here this morning at 1 o'clock, and continued 3 hours. Nearly 3 inches fell.

Braidwood, Ill., 20.—The ferry-boat across the Kankakee river at Wilmington sank in the middle of the river this morning, with 73 passengers. The current is swift, and it was with difficulty the passengers were rescued.

Manteroy, Ill., 20.—An old couple named Mettall were suffocated, by gas from a coal stove. They were discovered this morning. Three young men sleeping in the room above were resuscitated with difficulty.

New York, 20.—Judge Truax in the Superior Court to-day, appointed Franklin H. Smith, formerly secretary of the Columbia Consolidated Gold and Silver Mining Company, receiver of that corporation, and directed it to be dissolved, on application of certain trustees of the corporation, who assert that the mines which are in Nevada, are not sufficiently profitable to justify working. Edward L. Stokes is one of the claimants of the corporation for \$51,357.47.

NEW YORK, 20.—The Telegram has the following: Conkling said: 'I was with my sister all yesterday forenoon. She agreed to leave. When I went to her room last night, she said, 'There is that man in the room,' pointing towards a curtain that separated her bedroom; 'he won't leave me go, I'm afraid of him.' I said to her, 'If you wish to come with me, he cannot compel you to stay here. I'll speak to him.' So I went into the room and saw him looking very angry. He broke out, 'I'll be damned if I'll allow you to go on in this way in my own house,' and then he took off his coat and came at me as if he was going to box. I said, 'all right,' and made a motion as if to undo the buttons of my overcoat. He backed toward the mantel piece and took up the figure of a shepherd, and came at me with it. He raised it in both hands, and was going to strike me on the head. Then I pulled out my revolver and fired, and he fell instantly. I was so excited that I hardly remember what came next, but when I got cooler I found myself holding both his hands as he lay on the floor. He whispered, 'Will you go for a doctor?' I nodded, and went outside."

The Evening News says: The couple lived in luxuriant style. The front parlor was a gem, furnished in blue velvet, contained a piano; the tables and chairs were covered in blue satin and a rich velvet carpet covered the floor. Ebony and gold inlaid tables supported works of art. Curtains of lace, silk and damask were over the windows. The bedroom was a marvel of beauty; a bedstead of burnished bronze, surmounted by blue silk canopy, and white damask curtains stood in the centre, while the wardrobe was rare and costly. The furniture of the apartment throughout indicated luxury and wealth. Mrs. Haverstick is said to be anything but a handsome woman; she weighs about 70 pounds, and when not highly dressed, powdered and painted, looks far from prepossessing. She affected a very flashy style of clothing, and wore a profusion of jewelry.

The pistol with which Conkling shot Haverstick was in Captain McSwain's possession to-day. It is a terrible looking weapon, a 41 calibre .41 Bull-dog revolver, containing six barrels, one of which was discharged. The large China vase, 18 inches high, which Haverstick threw at Conkling, was also at the station house. It weighs eight pounds. The bullet entered Haverstick's abdomen and passed clean through the body. It is imbedded on one side of the backbone of the dead man, and can be plainly felt beneath the skin. Conkling is the larger man of the two.

In the afternoon, the coroner empanelled a jury, who viewed the body and Paris flats, heard the statement of the officer to whom Conkling surrendered, and then the court was adjourned. Haverstick's

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 19.—The Queen slipped upon the stairs of the Palace on Saturday and received injuries, but was able to hold a council with the Ministers yesterday.

There are rumors that two barrels of powder have been found in the vicinity of the large gasometers at King's Cross, London.

Lord Edmund Fitzmaurice stated that no demand for mediation in the trouble between France and Madagascar had been made, and that the government had no intention to increase the number of ships in Madagascar waters.

Byrne has resigned the secretaryship of the National Land & Labor League of Great Britain.

After Easter there is very likely to be great gaps in the ranks of the Irish party in the House of Commons. Several other members besides Mr. Parnell have apparently come to the conclusion that a change of scene to America will be good for their health. Not a few of them envy Messrs. Davitt & Healy, who are safe behind the bars, and so are not compelled to figure perilously in public.

Recent events go to confirm the conclusion that has long been entertained by conservative and impartial politicians here, that the Irish difficulty will ultimately drag the Gladstone Ministry down, backed though it is by the most powerful Parliamentary majority of modern times.

There are renewed rumors of the probability of the Earl of Rosebery's speedy accession to the Cabinet, taking of course the office of Lord President of the Council, which Lord Spencer has been holding some time along with the Lord Lieutenantship of Ireland. Liberals contend that the vacant seat should be given to a commoner, and to a representative of the radical wing of the party, and hold that Macauley's nephew and biographer, George Otterley, is the member of the administration who should be promoted.

The proposed international alliance against fanatics, anarchists, socialists and other enemies of society, has been discussed here a good deal lately, and the idea would probably be entertained favorably if there was any hope of the United States joining the league of the Governments. Great interest is felt here in learning the real views of the American people upon this important subject. Such an alliance is deemed by many, and these not alarmists, essential to the preservation of order; but the project has not yet been brought officially before the government.

Some doubt is expressed as to whether Mr. Parnell will be able to go to America or not. It is thought recent developments in the affairs of the Irish party may detain him. In the meantime, Mr. Justin McCarthy is preparing should he go, to take his place in the leadership of the Irish members.

The circumstances attending the death of Prince Gortschakoff promise to reveal one of the most startling political crimes of the age. There appears to be no longer any question of his having been poisoned.

It is probable that the informer Carey will be brought very close to the gallows after all. It is stated that evidence has been lately secured sufficient to convict him of the murder some years ago of a fellow workman, whom he threw into a drain and held there until he was choked to death.

Dublin, 19.—Rowells, awaiting trial in connection with the Phoenix Park murders, died in an epileptic fit in Kilmainham jail to-night.

Vienna, 19.—It is evident the charge of high treason against the Socialists on trial here has broken down.

St. Petersburg, 19.—Parsilleff, formerly director of the postoffice, who some time ago attempted suicide has again stabbed himself. The wounds this time are more serious.

Constantinople, 19.—A band of Arabs attacked four Ottoman battalions near Yemen. The Turks lost three officers and a number of soldiers killed and wounded. The Arabs were repulsed.

St. Etienne, 19.—Sixty miners attempted to rescue a comrade. The general armed used their weapons. One miner was killed; several arrests. Great excitement.

St. Petersburg, 20.—The Government of Moscow has received a letter warning him that the Kremlin,

where the Czar is to be crowned, will be blown up during the coronation ceremony if the Czar refuses to accede to the demanded concessions.

LONDON, 20.—In the House of Commons this afternoon, Sir Wm. Harcourt, Home Secretary, replying to a question by Captain O'Shea said, the police were carefully inquiring into the assault on Lady Florence Dixie. The inquiry was owing to the intention of the Parnellite members to press for an investigation because of suspensions cast upon the Laud League in connection with the case.
