occurred in Union square, where a large crowd fore down the red files. The police removed the "McClellan" flag. The second incident of similar origin was more exciting, several thousand people witnessing it at Fourth street

and Broadway. One young man who declared that he was not a Hearst sympathizer, made a speech, express-ing indignation that the American fing had been placed on a level with

the flag of anarchy. Another young man pushed his way through the crowd toward the poles supporting the banner, shouting. "Til do it, Til cut it down. We will get rid of that the of anarchy." of that flag of anarchy.

There was a cheer from the crowd which was heard for blocks, and a lane made for the young man, who made his way to one of the poles and climbed it. He cut the cord that held the flags and both fell to the street. On the side of the street on which the American flag fell many in the crowd

uncovered and the National emblent was picked up and carefully folded. The red flag, however, was trampled in the mud and finally was torn to pleces. By this time an extra force of police had arrived from a near-by sta-lice had arrived from a near-by sta-tion-house, and the young man who had cut down the flags was arrested, charged with disorderly conduct. He

was followed to the station-house by a crowd of several hundred persons, who jeered and denounced the police for making the arrest. Mayor McClellan today expressed

disapproval of the use of the red flag on some of the Tammany banners, and also directed that the speakers sup-porting him must not be guilty of perabuse of any of the opposing candidates,

didates, Charles F. Murphy, leader of Tam-many hall, said today that Tammany had nothing to do with the direction of the political displays on which the American flag and the red flag were placed side by side.

placed side by side, "We have nothing to do with them." said Mr. Murphy. "Those flags were put up by business men." Police Commissioner McAdoo said he intended to communicate today with

the persons responsible for hanging the red flags, and that he would take measures to prevent further disturb-ances over them. When Benjamin Hallet, the man ar-

vested at Fourth street and Broadway, was arrighed in Jefferson Market po-lice court, Magistrate Whitman told him that it was no insult to the Amer-lean flag to be hung on a banner with a red flag. He then added:

a red flag. He then added: "If you continue tearing down flags flke this you will be classed as an anarchist yourself. It is a matter for the courts to decide whether the American flag is subject to insult in such a fashion.
